Servia and Bulgara was concluded at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon. A cessation of hostilities was brought about through the efforts of Count "on Khevenhuller Metzch, Austro-Hungarian Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at Belgrade.

AN ARMISTICE CONCLUDED.

VIENNA, Nov. 28. — Dispatches received here state that the Bulgarian garrison at Widdiu made a sortie but was repulsed after desperate fighting, in which many bayonets were crossed and hand to hand struggles ensued. The slaughter was heavy on both sides.

SOFIA, Nov. 23.-Reports from Prince Alexander's headquarters, at the front. state that the Bulgarians continue their forward movement. A severe battle was fought at Pirot, in which the Bulgarians forced the Servians to retreat at the point of the bayonet and captured t at town. The town is occupied by a force of Bulgarians, and a portion of Prince Alexander's army has advanced several killometers beyond the town.


