### The Superior Court.

Court convened yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. It being apparent that the criminal docket and several injunction cases to be heard will consume the greater part of the second week of the term it was agreed on the part of the bar that the civil docket, in all cases where a jury will be required, be continued unless by consent.

The case of State vs. Wm. Slade and Job. Manly for larceny was resumed. P. H. Pelletier, Esq., opened the argument for the State in a clear and forcible speech, and was followed by W. E. Clarke for the defense. Mr. Moore put in one of his best efforts in closing the argument for the defense, and Mr. Manly followed him with a strong argument for the State. The speeches all sounded like money had been flying around. His Honor gave the case to the jury at about 2 o'clock, and up to the time of going to press they had not agreed.

State vs. Jere Joyner, larceny, was next taken up. Verdict, guilty; sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. Court adjourned to 9 o'clock Monday morning.

### The M. E. Conference.

Our special reporter to the M. E. Conference was so engaged in the affairs of the Conference that he was unable to send us reports as we expected, and, as we get no daily paper published at Charlotte, we were unable to keep up with the proceedings. From the report of the statistical Secretary we gather the following:

Number of members, 77,351, a gain of 2,463.  
Number of Sunday Schools 838, a gain of 12.  
Number of Sunday School scholars 45,040.  
Number of parsonages 105, a gain of 4.

Value of parsonages \$140,910, a gain of \$11,045.  
Number of churches 867, a gain of 21.  
Value of churches \$984,399, a gain of \$49,998.

Number of infants baptized 2,467.  
Number of adults baptized 3,017.  
The question of division of the conference was defeated by the following vote: Ayes, clerical 78, lay 14—total 92. Nays, clerical 87, lay 29—total 116.

Reidsville was selected as the place of meeting of the next conference.

It will be gratifying to Dr. Burkhead's many friends in this city to know that in the election of delegates to the General Conference, which meets in Richmond next May, he received the largest vote of any delegate elected, leading Dr. Wilson sixteen votes. Remunerative employment is what our southern girls need, and there is nothing for which they are more peculiarly fitted than teaching.

### NEWS BY MAIL.

**LOGAN DECLINES THE HONOR.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—At the Republican Senatorial caucus held today, the President pro tempore was unanimously tendered to Senator John A. Logan, but he declined it. The caucus then adjourned.

**FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH IN MACON DESTROYED BY FIRE.**  
MACON, Dec. 4.—A fire broke out last night in a dwelling in the rear of the First Baptist Church. The fire extended to the church and destroyed it. The church was recently built of brick, at a cost of \$38,000, and the interior was unfinished. The insurance on the church is \$10,000. The tower and side walls only were saved.

**FOREIGN.**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 4.—The Powers have appointed the consuls at Philadelphia to form a commission of inquiry. England is likely to hold aloof.

**LONDON, Dec. 4.**—The Times and Standard are astonished that the Sultan is listening to the advice of Russia, Germany and Austria, and is adopting a course which may lead to ruin. Turkey, they say, had better offend Russia, and take England's advice to recognize the union and unite the support of Bulgaria and Roumelia, than to find herself arrayed against Russia, Bulgaria, Austria and Greece.

**LONDON, Dec. 4.**—The Standard says if Turkey is blind enough to forge a weapon for her own destruction, England can only stand aloof. She cannot afford Bulgaria and Roumelia of the reward of their valor. When the Turks enter Roumelia evil days will come upon Turkey.
