### The Porpoise Fisheries.

From a Northern gentleman, who has just returned from Hatteras, N. C., where he had been looking into the porpoise fisheries in that vicinity, we yesterday gathered a few facts which are of interest concerning this new industry. The gentleman said that the porpoises run in large schools, follow a leader, and frequent certain portions of the Atlantic coast. It may be noted that but a limited number has been seen on the Virginia coast. Owing to the peculiar formation of the Hatteras beach, and the number of inlets feeding the Carolina sounds, the fish congregate in the vicinity of Cape Hatteras, and of course their capture is more readily effected at that point. The seines with which they fish are of great size and strength, some of them being a mile and a half in length. Every part of the fish is utilized, not a scrap going to waste. As soon as caught the hides are taken off, the blubber extracted and the remainder of the carcass is either smoked for the distant markets or worked up into fertilizers. The fin tail are made up into glue, and the bones converted into phosphates. The blood is saved and sold for tanning purposes, and the hide is tanned and placed upon the market in the form of a superior quality of leather for which fancy prices are obtained. The fisheries are attracting considerable attention from Northern capitalists, and we are assured that the new industry is as profitable as it is novel.—*Norfolk Virginian.*
