## Body Found

Yesterday morning the body of Stanly Lindley, the colored boy who was drowned on Monday night in Neuse river, was found near the place where the drowning occurred. Coroner Bates was notified and he summoned a jury of inquest who, after examining the body and inquiring the cause of his

death, returned a verdict of accidental drowning. The main witness before the jury was

Isaac Ellison, col., who testified that he and the boy were coming down Neuse river in a batteau partly loaded with

wood, and that when near Stimson's mill they struck a strong current which seemed to whirl the boat about considerable and she began to sink; that the boy became frightened and attempted to jump out but he prevented him at first by telling him he could put the boat

ashore before she sank; that he made for the shore but before going far the boy jumped out in spite of his remonstrances and called for an oar; that he threw him an oar and saw him grab for it a time or two and then sink. He was about 18 or 20 years old and came from six or eight miles up Neuse river.


