All persons who desire to take part in the annual services commemorative of the Confederate dead are cordially invited by the Ladies' Memorial Association to assemble on the Academy Green on Monday afternoon, the 10th inst., between the hours of 4 and 5 o'clock, where the following

ORDER OF EXERCISES
will be observed: Shortly before 5 o'clock the bugle will sound
"THE ASSEMBLY."

Punctually at 5 the call, "Attention!" will be sounded, and the exercises will begin.
I. Music by the choir—"The Guard Around the Tomb."
II. Prayer—Rev. V. W. Shields.
III. Music—"Honor to the Brave."
IV. Address—The Battle of New Berne. Colonel Edward D. Hall.
V. Music—"Bury me Near the Old Home."

After the music the bugle will again sound "Attention!" when the Marshals will form a procession as follows:

1ST DIVISION.
Newbern Silver Cornet Band,
Confederate Soldiers and Sailors,
Assistant Marshals.

2ND DIVISION.
Orator and Chaplain,
Ladies Memorial Association,
Assistant Marshals.

3RD DIVISION.
Civil Organizations—Citizens,
Children bearing flowers,
Assistant Marshals.

The procession will march to the Cemetery, the several divisions passing through the Confederate lot without halting, preserving their organization, dividing to right and left in passing the monument, and will deposit their flowers upon the mound in the centre of the lot in passing. After passing through the lot ranks will be broken and all will assemble around the circle, where the concluding ceremonies will be held as follows:

VII. Benediction.

VIII. Last bugle call, "Taps."

We are requested by the writer of the following communication to publish it for the encouragement of farmers:

"Mr. G. W. Smith
3 week in April plowed out four furrows to the 2 Acs in corn.
"Made one compost about 25 loads, hauled 15 loads stable manure. Went half mile and dug up and hauled 6 loads of woods mould.
"Made 3 com post 100 loads. Each measured 15 Bu. cotton seed and made up an amile and unloaded. Put back 15 Bu. cotton seed and listed in with 3 furrows list

"Put out 70 loads and covered with a 3 furrowed list.
"Burned off 2 Ares of ground.
"Burnt 13 log heaps
"Went 2 hundred yods after a turn of rail Crossing a Ditch found a turtle turned Back got his pitchfork carried him to the house confined him in a be gum Went Back and got his Rails Put up fence around a half A of land.
"His nearest neighbors know the work was done the 3 Sunday Put out one Bu of ashes, and put out 3 pieces rows in stable manure and covered with 3 furrow list walked 1 of a mile to move a neighbors house
"this Weeks Work Mr. "Smith
"will certify himself "G. W. Smith

"Pa. When His weeks work was ended he went 2 miles a got load of corn and fodder. Thin could jump 10 ft essay or he could shake his feet to 3 times."

Bond of J. M. Harget, city Marshal for \$250 with E. M. Pavie and A. H. Holton, sureties, accepted.

The Mayor appointed the following committees.

Streets and pumps—Daniels, Hancock and Styron.

Finance—Moore, Williams and Draney.

Sanitary—Williams, Miller and Draney.

Cemetery—Miller, Hancock and Crawford.

Fire Dept.—Moore, Williams and Crawford.

Police—Hancock, Daniels and Styron.

Ordinances and licenses—Hancock, Daniels and Draney.

Wharves and docks—Williams, Moore and Crawford.

Fire district—Daniels, Hancock and Williams.

Councilman Daniels or any other member of the board was authorized to make a contract with the city similar to one with Mrs. Ellis last year in regard to money.

The tax collector was ordered to collect the licenses as formerly until the board could act.

The question of sprinkler was referred to committee on streets and pumps, with power to act.

The Mayor was authorized to accept service in \$98.58, old vouchers held by Mr. T. A. Green.

Matter of janitor of market was referred to Sanitary Com. with power to act.

A New Coast Line.

Yesterday's Philadelphia Times says: The failure of the New York, Philadelphia and Norfolk Railroad Company to make satisfactory traffic arrangements for the Southern coast line trade with the lines centering at Norfolk, has led it to inaugurate new measures to increase its business. Today the contract will be let for three new steamers for the Pamlico sound and Southern coast trade. These will run in opposition to the coast lines now carrying freight to Baltimore. As the line from Norfolk shorter by the New York, Philadelphia and Norfolk, than by Baltimore, it is expected that considerable additions will be made to the present traffic. The freight agent of the road reports that an average of sixty through cars per day are being sent over the line, which number will be greatly increased as soon as the small fruit season opens.

The shad business is quite heavy just now, as it only requires twenty-four hours to remove the fish from the waters of the Chesapeake to the frying pans of Philadelphia homes. The company is constantly stretching out and apparently will not be satisfied until it controls a through line to the Gulf.
