Hyde Superior Court convenes tomorrow. Messrs. M. DeW. Stevenson, F. M. Simmons and the JOURNAL agent, C. C. Taylor of New Berne will be in attendance.

Col. B. S. Pardee returned last night from a visit to Trenton and Kinston. He was struck with the marked improvement in Kinston since his visit there two years ago.

Capt. Thos. E. Payne, of this city, sent to the JOURNAL office yesterday a package of new Irish potatoes. They were about the right size to go with spring chicken, and, with the chicken, would make a delightful dish. Thanks, Seymour Dennison, a little son of Maj. Dennison, came near being drowned while playing on a raft of logs near Cawman & Thompson's mill on Friday evening. One of the logs turned with him and he went in. A son of Mr. S. D. Pope being near by, went to his assistance and saved him after he had gone under the second time.

We publish the statement of the Finance Committee of the city council this morning. It is a good showing, and it must be gratifying to taxpayers to see that the indebtedness of the city has been reduced. The retiring board has done well and sets a good example to all which may follow, especially in the matter of paying cash as they go. The interest paid on the money borrowed to enable them to do this, was saved several times over by the deductions on salaries and purchases in consideration of cash instead of vouchers. By paying cash the officers and employees are better satisfied with less pay and the speculation in city vouchers is broken up.

**Trouble with Cut Worms.**  
A Saunder's store item in the Beaufort Record says:

The abundance of cut worms troubling the farmers are beyond precedent. In some instances their ravages have literally destroyed the corn and melons. We hear that Capt. L. T. Oglesby will have to replant nine tenths of his melons cut down by this worm. Many of our farmers are without a stand of corn and melons now, and still the destruction is going on. Mr. K. Tolson's little children caught today on a small patch of less than 7 acres of melons 800 of these worms. What are we to do? There is but one sure remedy against this pest and that is to make our lands rich. They will not eat or breed on land naturally rich.

**The University of North Carolina.**  
The catalogue of the University of North Carolina for the session 1885-'86 shows 204 students.

The preparatory classes in Latin and Greek were discontinued at the beginning of the year, although many students of insufficient preparation were therefore excluded from the University.

The Faculty numbers fifteen, with an additional member to be added during the coming summer. The vacancy in Greek, caused by the death of Prof. Hooper, is also to be filled at the next meeting of the board.

The courses of instruction have been extended and elevated by the increase in the Faculty. Continuous instruction is offered for four years in Latin, Greek, English, modern languages and mathematics. In the sciences enlarged facilities have been provided for work in the laboratory and field; and in these, as also in moral philosophy, instruction extends over a longer period than formerly.

A college of agriculture and the mechanic arts, a Department of Normal Instruction and a school of law offer special courses to students in these branches of study.

Perhaps the most striking improvement in the work of the University is the post-graduate instruction that is offered in every department.

II. Prayer—Rev. V. W. Shields.  
III. Music—"Honor to the Brave."  
IV. Address—The Battle of New Berne, Colonel Edward D. Hall.  
V. Music—"Bury me Near the Old Home."

After the music the bugle will again sound "Attention!" when the Marshals will form a procession as follows:

**1ST DIVISION.**  
Newbern Silver Cornet Band,  
Confederate Soldiers and Sailors,  
Assistant Marshals.

**2ND DIVISION.**  
Orator and Chaplain,  
Ladies Memorial Association,  
Assistant Marshals.

**3RD DIVISION.**  
Civil Organizations—Citizens,  
Children bearing flowers,  
Assistant Marshals.

The procession will march to the Cemetery, the several divisions passing through the Confederate lot without halting, preserving their organization, dividing to right and left in passing the monument, and will deposit their flowers upon the mound in the centre of the lot in passing. After passing through the lot ranks will be broken and all will assemble around the circle, where the concluding ceremonies will be held as follows:

VI. Music—Male chorus—"Teating on the Old Camp Ground."  
VII. Benediction.  
VIII. Last bugle call, "Taps."  
All are requested to bring flowers, and to observe carefully the directions for passing the Confederate lot.

**Another Arrest of an Agitator.**  
CHICAGO, Ill., May 7.—Wm. Stahlknecht, the president of the cabinet makers, union, and also a professional agitator, was arrested at an early hour this morning on a warrant issued by justice Bragton. Stahlknecht is accused of intimidating workmen. The arrest was made near the house of the accused and a private detective, who effected it, says the prisoner tried to cut him with a knife. Stahlknecht has incurred the enmity of the furniture manufacturers' association by inciting strikes and preventing the men from conferring with their employers. It is alleged that he participated in Tuesday night's demonstration at the Haymarket.

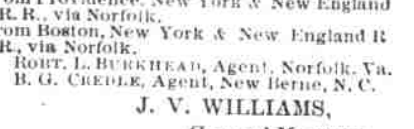
