BILL PRINTING POR ATTURN POSTAL CARDS.

WASHINGTON; D/ C., June 1.-Senator Wilson, of Iowa, today introduced in the Senate a bill to authorize the Postmaster General to adopt and furnish double or return possal cards. It provides that should the control of such cards be held under patent he may concards be held under patent he may con-tract and agree to pay a reasonable sum for the exclusive ownership and convol each patent within the United States, and the cannot eccure such ownership he is further authorized to contract and agree to hay a reasonable royalty on each thousand of such Cards until the life of such unter transfil exclusion.


