## CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

**NEW BERNE, JUNE 15.**  
The board met this evening pursuant to adjournment, Mayor Meadows in the chair and Councilmen Williams, Hancock, Moore, Miller, Daniels and Drane present.

The finance committee recommended that the following taxes be levied for the present year: on real and personal property and on income, 50 cents on the \$100 valuation; on poll, \$1.50.

Report adopted and taxes levied as per report.

Mrs. Churchill requested permission to renew the roof of her house. The matter was referred to the fire district committee with power to act.

A request of J. T. Hall for permission to build a shed was referred same as above.

Councilman Hancock, from committee on ordinances and losses, moved to repeal chap. 6, sec. 8, of the ordinances, which motion was adopted.

The following ordinance, presented by Councilman Hancock, was adopted, all being aye except Councilman Moore, who stated he considered the ordinance illegal.

Be it ordained, That any person who shall keep open any store or shop on Sundays, except in cases of necessity, shall pay upon conviction a fine of five dollars. Provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall prevent any drug store or apothecary shop from being kept open for the sale of drugs and medicines only. Provided further, that the baker shops of the city may be open for the transaction of their usual business from 7 to 9 o'clock a. m. on Sundays, and that ice houses may be kept open for the sale of ice from 7 to 9 o'clock a. m.; from 5 o'clock p. m. and from 6 to 7 p. m. on Sundays. Provided, also, that nothing in this ordinance shall prevent the sale of milk in the City of New Berne on Sunday or the sale of meats or fish from 5 to 9 o'clock a. m. on said day.
