HOW IS THIS FOR A GIANT?
Ansonia Correspondent gives the following description of a North Carolina giant:

Miles Darden, probably the largest man on record, was born in North Carolina in 1798, and died in Henderson County, Tenn., Jan. 23, 1857. He was 7 feet 6 inches high, and in 1845 weighed 371 pounds. At his death his weight was a little over 1,000 pounds. Until 1853 he was active and lively, and able to labor, but from that time he was obliged to stay at home, or to be hauled about in a two horse wagon. In 1833 his coat was buttoned around three men, each weighing more than 200 pounds, who walked together in it across the square at Lexington. His coffin was 8 feet long, 35 inches deep, 52 inches across the broad, 18 inches across the head, and 14 inches across the feet.
