It is not a matter of course that the ordinary should be kept as a removed from politics as possible and to carry out this idea the constitution provided for the election of judges by the General Assembly, and they were elected for life or during good behavior. The sudden change made in our constitution to elect judges by the people, was a dangerous experiment, and the result has shown that it was not the safest plan to preserve the integrity, honor and impartiality of the bench. The Democratic party of North Carolina has been the champion of the elective system of its odious features by putting none but pure, able, conscientious and honest men up to be voted for, and these have always obtained from an active part in the canvases after they were nominated. But we fear it will not always be so. Ambitious aspirants will soon tire of waiting for the spontaneous call of the people, and will begin to push their claims by electing schemes that will lead to a partisan judiciary worse than that of 1869-70.
