In the criminal docket at this term of the Superior Court numbers 186 cases. A few of them were continued to the next term of the court, while the docket has been cleared of all others.

An unusual and exciting episode occurred in the Superior Court last Saturday morning. The officer who had in charge the jury that tried Job L. Stroud that week, reported Chas. H. Brown, a promising attorney at the Kinston bar and of counsel for Brown, to the Judge for a willful attempt to influence the jury in his verdict.

Mr. Brown was seen to enter the jury room at night while in charge of the jury and to talk with them in the hearing of one of the jurors. This was indignantly denied by Mr. Brown in open court under oath.

The accused with his wife and children, were immediately sent and soon returned a "true bill." The matter was afterwards reported at Monday morning and the accused pleaded guilty to the charge.

It was again called up Monday, the State being represented by Solicitor Allen and the accused by John E. Wooten and Judge Strong. The officer of the jury, G. W. Waters, and one of the jurors swore to the charge before stated. The defense introduced Mr. Forth and his sister, in whose boarding house the jury boarded, testifying that the accused was an old friend of theirs and they had requested him to see to the care and comfort of the jury. Mr. Forth being a boarder at their house. After argument by counsel and charge by the Judge, the jury took the case and in a short time returned a verdict of "guilty." No sentence is imposed at this time.
