What our farmers are to do for pork is more than I can divine, for all have lost hogs and some nearly all they had. C. H. Fowler has lost 29 out of 42, F. F. Cherry 12 out of 26, Dr. Attmore 10 out of 14, and what was their loss in general throughout the county. How can we raise pork without hogs! The only answer I can give is to get some of your Gum Branch itemizer's greasy collard seed.

We have had rather a dull time in transportation since the Elm City was taken off of our waters, but she has returned to stay, so her manager says, and will give us direct freight to Norfolk and to New Berne twice a week, and then we have the schooners D. O. Willis, Mary Bryan, Susie and the J. J. Wolfenden to finish up with, so I do not anticipate any trouble to get our produce to a market provided they all hold on.

There was quite a serious assault at Q. M. Sawyer's, near Bayboro, on the 2d inst. A young man by the name of Martin Gibbs and Quince had some misunderstanding about a team, when he (Q) struck Gibbs on the head with a hoe and knocked him down, cutting his head quite severely. On trial before W. N. Pugh, J. P., the accused waived an examination, but Dr. Ross, the attending physician, was examined by the J. P. so as to satisfy himself as to the bond and the Doctor's testimony being taken, a justified bond of \$500 dollars was demanded and given for his appearance to the next Superior court. Martin is still living and will probably get over it, though the doctor says his skull bone is cut through to the brain.

Secretary Lamar's Full Name. WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—A question lately arose among the clerks in the Interior Department as to the given name of Secretary Lamar.
