Swanboro Items.

Mr. Ed. Perry, signal service officer at New river, in town. Principal work now is digging potatoes, and the principal food we have now here is mulllets and potatoes, and we eat 'em cause we have to; we haint got mullin else, as the old darkey said, he loved possum and 'aters; we hate love mulllets and 'aters.

Rev. P. J. Carraway, P. E. of this district will preach at Queens creek church on Sunday night of the same day of the quarterly meeting to be held at Tabernacle church, and baptize all applicants for admission to the church at that place, and others also. Go to hear him.

The election is over and all well. Very small turn out with us; only about one-half a vote in our precinct, and not much more in the county. All the nominees were elected, and our old sheriff, Murrill, pulled through again by about 250 majority. Sanders, for Senate, got about 450 majority over Hoyt and Whitford.

Capt. Heady has over 300 diamond back terrapins in his garden now ready for shipment. They are worth about \$10 per dozen. Heady caught a load of surf fish, large drums, bluefish and sunfish; among the former were some that were over four feet long and weighed 80 pounds each. The bluefish sold for 3c. each, and the sunfish for 20c. each; drums from 5c. to 75c. each.

A fire occurred in our village last Saturday night in which the dwelling house owned by W. D. Harget and occupied by Elijah Sewell and family, was totally destroyed and all in the house except one mattress. Even their clothes and everything else were burned, and one of their children came very near being burned in the house. Fire was discovered by Mrs. Julia Hill about 1:30 o'clock p. m. No clue as to the origin and no insurance on anything. Friends, insure your property.

Mr. Bryan Blount, brother of Dr. Blount, from Seven Springs, Wayne county, in town buying fish. He bought 800 pounds small mullets and 200 pounds large ones, paying \$1.25 per 100 pounds for small ones and \$3.50 for large ones. All the fisheries are catching their last run of little mullets now. Bouge, Bear, Browns Inlet, Cedar Point, Sheby Point and Mount Pleasant caught this week and last, from 2,500 to 20,000 of these little mullets every day at each place. These fish are from four to six inches long, and won't catch in a one-inch mesh net; a six and a stams to catch such fish. They sell from 35c. to 50c. per 100 in the round, and from 75c. to \$1.25 per 100 pounds salt. We can never have any big mullets any more, as long as people are allowed to use such small mesh nets, and they also allowed to fish all night, too. Like they do around Swanboro and Beaufort. See the difference in price: small \$1.00 per 100 pounds, and large from \$3.50 to \$4.00.

Schooner Ray, Dennis, arrived in port from Philadelphia, bound to New river with general merchandise for Hall & Pearson & Co., at Tar Landing, W. N. Marine and Ed. S. Smith at Court House Bay, New river. The Ray is now commanded by that prince of sea captains, Bill Dennis, and none need be afraid to ship anything by the Ray, as she is always on time. Schooner Basket, Joe Bloodgood, cleared last week for New river, Wallace creek, for freight from Dr. Montfort and others, for New Berne. Schooner Gold Leaf lying in port waiting for repairs. Capt. Hill says he can't go to sea in his safety as she is, and hopes her owner, Mr. C. Stephens, of Richlands, will soon have her repaired. Schooner Etta, M. Bloodgood, gone in the rice trade to S. C. Flat Willie B., John Bloodgood, cleared for New Berne loaded with cotton and naval stores; also flat May Queen, L. Robertson, cleared for same place, loaded with same freight.
