Improving Cotton Land.

Please tell me how best to improve my cotton land. I manured the present crop with 200 pounds acid phosphate, 100 pounds kainit, fifteen bushels cotton seed and fifteen bushels stable manure to the acre, mixed by Farman's formula and allowed to stand eight weeks in heaps. In February I turned under the stalks and with them a fair manuring of swamp mud, woods mould, lime and fresh salt, and on this bed put the acid phosphate, etc., just before planting. How much acid phosphate should I put to the acre next year, and what other manure with it? Land is level and easily drained with good clay subsoil. Has been cultivated in cotton past five or six years with but little manure. Past season has been unfavorable, will make about 250 lbs. lint per acre. Will thank you for any suggestion in cultivating and manuring cotton and corn on such land.—F. W. Edenton, N. C.

ANSWER.—You could not do better than to repeat for several years what you did the present year, applying the same kinds and same quantities of manures. It would be better to rotate crops instead of planting cotton continually, you might follow with corn, follow corn with oats, and oats with cotton. Manure cotton and corn as above; the oats might go unmanured, but would be better with manure. One hundred pounds each of acid phosphate and cotton seed meal per acre will help the oat crop decidedly. Sowry in cotton held in August or September, and turn under in spring when getting ready for corn. Never leave land bare through the winter.—Southern Cultivator.
