NATIONAL BANK LAWS.

THE REPORT OF THE CONTROLLER OF THE CURRENCY.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—The annual report of the Controller of the Currency contains suggestions for the amendment of the National Bank laws in about a dozen instances.

Since the beginning of the system in 1863 only 112 national banks have failed. Of these 38 have paid their credits in full and 20 have paid interest besides, 15 in full and 5 in part.

Among the corporations holding national bank stock the greatest amount is held by savings banks, trust companies and insurance companies.

Besides the usual tables showing the condition of national banks at various dates the report this year contains an abstract which specifies each item of their resources and liabilities.

The specie held by the national banks in 1866 was \$19,000,000; in October, 1875, it was only \$8,000,000, while in July, 1885, it was \$117,000,000, and is now \$156,000,000.
