Opposed to Joining the K. of L.

Pittsburg, Dec. 1.—The returns from the vote taken by the Amalgamated Iron and Steel Workers on the question of joining the Knights of Labor are coming in to the headquarters rapidly. Secretary Martin refuses to say what the returns indicate, but from another reliable source it was learned that there is so far a preponderating majority against a connection with the Knigts of Labor. A large number of influential lodges have voted almost to a man against any such move. Several of the smaller lodges are inclined to identify themselves with the Knights of Labor, so that, to use their own expression. "the conflict against capital can be more formidable on the part of labor." While the great body of the members seem to be opposed to merging the Amalgamated Association in the Knights of Labor, the movement to organize in both unions is still going on. While these men do not wish to abandon the independent union, they wish to have the advantages derived from being in the Knights of labor.
