Visitors in the city frequently speak of our delightful winter climate. While other portions of the State are blocked up with snow and ice, New Berne has had none of it.  
We are requested by Sheriff Stimson to call the attention of those interested to the fact that a penalty is attached to failure to take out license as a trader or to engage in any other business or profession. The time has already expired and those who have neglected it had better procure their license at once. See notice in this issue.  
Our neighbor the Free Will Baptist, is six years old. It is a neatly printed and very readable paper. It is worthy of a liberal support from the denomination it represents. Brother Hearne has labored long and faithfully in the cause and his brethren ought to rally to his support. If there are any over-conscientious Democrats in the General Assembly who would hesitate to vote to keep Clark and Lane there, they ought to attend an election at James City and see exactly how the thing is conducted. The law by which the board of canvassers were governed in their action, was intended to meet just such outrages as were perpetrated in Craven in the last election. If they wish to establish the precedent that a mob can, and ought, to control elections, then their boasted free ballot is a farce.  
A Seal in Pamlico Sound.  
Capt. E. L. Keeler, of Brant Island light, is in the city. His reports having seen a seal at his station a few days ago. In a few hours after he saw him, a party of sportsmen came along in a yacht and informed him that they too had seen the seal and shot it. They thought they killed it, but were not able to recover it.

**The Legislative Contest.**  
A large number of witnesses will leave this morning for Raleigh to go before the House committee on privileges and elections in the case of Hussey against Lane.  
We wish to remind our democratic friends, independents, republicans and all others who are in favor of a free ballot, that the board of canvassers of Craven county declared Messrs. Clark and Lane received a majority of the legal ballots cast in the late election and were duly elected, and that they did it in accordance with the election laws now in force. They had evidence of the intimidation of voters at the James City precinct, and since the day they assembled in the court house other irregularities and improper methods used in controlling the election have been brought to light which will be made to appear before the committee.  
The very member, Mr. White of Perquimans, who, without investigation, introduced a resolution declaring Hussey entitled to the seat, lived in New Berne long enough to know something of the character of the voters at the James City precinct and he is certainly aware of the fact that a colored man dared not vote a democratic ticket and stay there. It was only when two democrats were running on the same ticket with republicans that a democratic candidate ever dared to speak in James City, and as soon as it was evident that they had made an impression that would divide the colored vote there, the bulldozing process was brought into requisition. The woman were told that the men who were canvassing the district to enroll the school children only wanted to get their names in order to have them bound out as soon as Clark and Lane were elected, believing this, they appeared at the polls in arms, ready for those who voted the coalition ticket. If these and many other reports of illegal methods resorted to to control the election are true, and they are made to appear so to members of the General Assembly, then the action of the board of canvassers ought to be sustained. There are democrats and republicans in this county, and a large number of them, who hold that the board was right in declaring Clark and Lane elected to the General Assembly, because they believe that these gentlemen received a majority of the legal votes cast. The General Assembly should be slow to reverse this action of the board and thus place a premium upon bulldozing, bribery, corruption and intimidation.  
**The Retiring Cashier.**  
The retiring of Dr. J. A. Guion from the position of cashier of the National Bank, an office which he has filled with great fidelity to the interest committed to him and with universal satisfaction to the patrons of the institution, was an event that is regretted by the whole community; especially, as it was brought about by declining health. His many friends hope that he will by rest and quiet, be greatly benefited and regain his former vigor.

RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 12, 1887.  
Among the bills of importance introduced in the Senate was the following: To establish North Carolina Normal and Collegiate Institute for Negroes.  
In House bills were introduced: To repeal law against concealed weapons; to provide for working public roads by taxation; making appropriation for colored orphan asylum at Oxford.  
The House tabled the bill to provide a prosecuting attorney for each county.  
Most of the session of the House was occupied in the discussion of special order, being Pearson's resolution attacking Democrats in Congress for failure to pass the Blair bill and repeal the Internal Revenue law, and instructing them to do both these things. After the resolutions had been modified greatly, thanks to Democratic demands, the House adopted them by a large majority. The vote was not on party lines, but the debate was very exciting.

## Forty-Ninth Congress—Second Session.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Senate.—Mr. Hoar, from the Select Committee on Centennial Celebrations, reported resolutions declaring it expedient that action be taken by Congress for the due celebration in Washington about April 30th, 1889, of the Centennial of the adoption of the Constitution, and directing the committee to consider the purpose of the best mode of celebration. Adopted.  
On motion of Mr. Dawes, the House amendments to the Senate bill to provide lands for Indians in severalty, were now concurred, and in a conference asked. The Senate, at 12:50, took up the Inter-State Commerce bill, and Mr. Black took the floor with a speech in favor of the conference report, followed by Messrs. Cullom and Harris in long speeches in favor of the report.  
Mr. Stanford followed in a long argument against the bill, which he said would work discrimination against the railroads and in favor of the waterways. At 1 o'clock the Senate went into secret session, and when the doors were reopened, adjourned.  
**House.**—Mr. Dibble, of South Carolina, presented the oath of office taken and subscribed to by D. Wyatt Aiken as a Representative in Congress from the Third Congressional District of South Carolina, and offered a resolution reciting that Mr. Aiken, by reason of sickness, had been unable to appear personally in the House to take the oath of office, and declaring that the oath now presented be received by the House as the oath of office of Mr. Aiken. The oath is identical in form and words with that administered by the Speaker. Mr. Dibble stated that though Mr. Aiken had not been able to appear personally in the House, he had attended to all his duties by means of correspondence.  
On the suggestion of Mr. Burrows, of Michigan, who thought that the resolution would form too impartial a precedent to be adopted without investigation. The matter was referred to the committee on judiciary.  
Under the call of States a number of bills and resolutions were introduced and referred. Among them were the following:  
By Mr. Oates, of Alabama—Making ten years' residence of aliens prerequisite to naturalization.  
By Mr. Davidson, of Florida—To establish a national quarantine station near Key West, Fla.  
By Mr. Green, of North Carolina—To grade taxes on the basis of income.  
By Mr. Tillman, of South Carolina—To prevent the destruction of human life by fire in railroad accidents. It forbids the use in mail or passenger cars of any stove or heating apparatus containing any inflammable substance except illuminating gas. The bill also requires the cars to be heated by steam and lighted by gas or electricity, and to carry saws, hammers, and other tools for working purposes. The bill provides for the punishment of railroad directors who neglect to observe its provisions.  
This order includes the Edmunds-Tucker anti-Polygamy bill. The floor was then given to the District of Columbia Committee. A large number of bills were passed affecting the administration of the local government. The most important being one appropriating \$110,000 for the construction of a bridge across the eastern branch of the Potomac river at the foot of Pennsylvania avenue. Adjourned.

All persons now engaged in any trade, profession or business in Craven county, taxed under Schedule "B" of the Revenue Laws of North Carolina, are hereby notified to come forward and renew their license on or before the 10th day of January, 1887, at this office for the ensuing year commencing January 1st, 1887. And all persons desiring to engage in any business must also obtain a license.  
Section 40 of the Revenue Act of 1883 enacts as follows:  
"Every person who shall practice any trade or profession or use any franchise taxed by the laws of North Carolina, without having first paid the tax and obtained a license as herein required, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall also forfeit and pay to the State a penalty not to exceed twenty dollars, which penalty shall be deemed to be a fine, and shall be recovered as such, and shall cause to be recovered before any Justice of the Peace of the county."
