Proceedings of Board of Commissioners of Craven County, 1st Monday in March, 1887.

John F. Kirkman and others presented a petition for a new public road leading from Beaver Dam on Swift Creek across the lands of Wm. Pate.

E. M. Sperling, by his attorney, C. C. Clark, made a demand for the payment of a note for \$5,000, executed by the board March 1st, 1884.

The poll tax of Frank Willis for 1886 was remitted, he being a lunatic and an inmate of the asylum.

John Gaskins and others presented a petition for a new public road, on Neuse road, north side of Neuse river, to Beaver Dam crossing on Swift Creek.

The supervisor of roads and bridges of No. 6 township submitted his report, which was concurred in by the board and in the building of Swift creek bridge.

J. H. Beeton tendered his resignation as inspector of cord wood and as inspector of cord stores.

Timothy Keeler & Co. were granted license to retail liquors near the corner of South Front and Middle streets for the year 1887.

Sheriff Stinson submitted a report in regard to schedule B taxes, etc., which was approved and filed.

Commissioner Brinson submitted his monthly report of condition of bridges, etc., which was approved and filed.

Commissioner Watson submitted his monthly report on condition of the poor, etc., which was approved and filed.

C. R. Price and Wallace Price were allowed fees as witnesses in the case of State vs. Asa Ypock.

The county treasurer was ordered to pay upon the warrant of the chairman \$45-100 dollars to R. B. Nelson, being the amount of his account for cash and labor performed on stock law fence in No. 1 township.

W. H. Jackson appeared and tendered his bond as inspector of cord wood for the city of New Berne, which was approved and the oath of office administered.

The clerk was ordered to advertise for sealed proposals for repairing the bridge across Brice's creek in No. 7 township.

The clerk was ordered to notify M. Hahn, ex-sheriff, that the soon occupied by him in the court house will be needed for use of U. S. district court, and that he must vacate the same from that date.
