NOT MR. JONES, BUT THE GOVERNOR.

The News and Observer, in noticing the position we take that the Governor made a serious political blunder in appointing the Commissioner of Labor, says: Commissioner Jones has been identified with the mechanical class all his life.

blunder, politically speaking? Why put a stick in the hands of the enemy to crack your own head? The party that puts a man in the Executive chair is generally held responsible for his acts. Of course it cannot be expected that all his acts will redound to the interest of his party, but with the recent experience of the Democratic party in Wake with the Knights of Labor, the Governor ought to have exercised more than ordinary caution in making this appointment.

We learn from the Chronicle that Mr. J. M. BROUGHTON, who is a leading member of the Knights of Labor and State Statistician for the order, is to be Chief Clerk under Mr. JONES. This, it is to be hoped, will partly counteract the error of the Governor, and make Mr. JONES acceptable to the Knights.

Wonderful Mind Reading.

IRVING HIGGINS PERFORMS A WONDERFUL FEAT IN NEW YORK. The fact that Mr. Irving Bishop, the mind-reader, was going to make a blind dash out of the Hoffman House, New York, some time during Saturday afternoon, and rush off in search of an article hidden somewhere within a mile of the hotel by a committee selected for the purpose, became so well known that a great crowd gathered about the Twenty-fifth street entrance to the hotel, and waited in the cold.

When the mind-reader and the three committeemen were started in the wagon the committeemen held their bare hands close to Mr. Bishop's hooded head for a moment, and then Mr. Bishop, with a tight grip on the reins, started the horses towards Broadway with three carriages and about 500 people following in his wake.

The blindfolded driver took the left-hand side of the road, but avoided all vehicles well enough, driving at a lively trot to the east side of 51 Madison square, then to Twenty-third street, then to Fourth avenue, and then to Eighteenth street. At Eighteenth street and Fourth avenue, he hesitated for a moment and only escaped collision with a street car by driving close to the curb. He then turned into Eighteenth street and went quickly to Irving Place, where he turned to the left and headed for Gramercy Park. On arriving at the park he turned to the right, and drove so slowly that the crowd surged up closely around his wagon and filled the street, one well-dressed man being knocked down by a carriage which was following in the mind-reader's wake.

After five minutes Mr. Bishop appeared with the wraps off his head, his face flushed, and his eyes dancing with excitement. He held aloft the pin and the crowd cheered. Then he got into the wagon and held the pin up again, and the crowd cheered again, and the mind-reader and his committee, with the three carriages in the wake, drove quietly back to the hotel by the nearest route.

he was greeted with hand clapping, and when quiet came, Col. Knox said: "Mr. Bishop found the pin under a vase which stood on the mantel on the south side of the reception room of the part of Gramercy Park Hotel." Strange Phenomenon in Indiana.

THE EARTH COVERED WITH A YELLOW SUBSTANCE. A Chicago Times special from Evansville, Ind., says: The residents of Princeton and vicinity are much exercised over a phenomenon which occurred there Sunday. A severe rain storm began before daybreak, and when the citizens awoke they found the earth covered to the depth of an inch with a yellow substance. The doctors and chemists have examined it, but vary their conclusions. Nearly all agree, however, that it is a vegetable formation of some kind. Portions were sent to a scientist at Indianapolis for analysis. Frank Blair made a partial analysis, and says: The substance possesses many of the characteristics of sulphur. It is of a pale yellow color, insoluble in water or alcohol, but fully soluble in oil of turpentine and by sulphide of carbon. Only having a small quantity, I could not make a fire test. When allowed to crystallize out of a solution of bisulphide of carbon and placed under a microscope it is found to be composed of small round bodies, which, magnified thirty diameters, have the appearance of mustard seeds and differ from ordinary sulfur sulphur. It is probably of volcanic origin, and this is borne out by the recent discovery of foreign products in this city thought to be eruptive bodies.

Reports from various other quarters of the district are to the effect that the phenomenon has been general in the counties of Warwick, Spencer and Pike.
