The Surveyors and Commissioners of the inter-State Survey between Virginia and North Carolina met in Edenton on Friday and Saturday and authorized Surveyor Greenleaf to make a map of the survey of the line and adjourned to meet again. We understand that a project is on foot to establish a National Bank in Elizabeth city. A gentleman in Raleigh has offered to put \$25,000 into the capital stock upon condition that the balance is subscribed by citizens of the town. C. H. Robinson of this town has subscribed \$5,000.
