A Brilliant Bash by a Confederate Naval Officer.

The firing at this time became so hot that it did not seem possible that more than half the Confederates would escape some of them had to struggle with three opponents. There was no halting, no cowardice; every man stood at his post gallant enemy. Colonel Wood, with in May: the bullets whistling around him, issued his orders as coolly and unconcernedly as if the enemy had not been in sight. Con-

spicuous among all was the conduct of the marines under Capt. Thos. Wilson, of the C. S. marine corps, who fought well. The Confederates steadily but inch, and in five minutes had driven the Federals below, where they cried for quarter. The fighting then ceased and the ship was a prize to the Confederates. The loss of the boarders was severe, having 6 killed and about 30 wounded out of 100 men, or losing nearly onethird of their command. of their crew. Before the steamer was secured the Federals opened upon her Wood from securing his prize. To boats and the steamer made ready for firing. In five minutes after the boarders left the side, the Underwriter was one mass of flame, burning up the dead bodies of the Federals killed in the bedies of the Federals killed in the action. After leaving the burning vessal the boats returned up Neuse to Swift creek, where the wounded were landed and the Confederate dead buried. General Pickett having shandoned the attack upon New Berne, the 'navy on wheels' returned to Richmond and the other stations from which the boat crews had been detailed.

For the gallantry displayed by Col. Wood, he was promoted to a post captain in the navy, and Lieut. Loyali to commander. Both officers and men received the thanks of the Conderate Congress for their gallant conduct.
