NEWS NOTES.

Oliver Hoyt, the millionaire leather merchant, died at Stamford, Conn., last Thursday.

The Chinese portion of San Jose, Cal., was destroyed by fire Wednesday. Loss \$75,000; insurance \$40,000.

F. M. White, for fifteen years president of the Mississippi and Tennessee Railroad, died at Memphis, Tenn., last Thursday.

The Johnston Forge Company shops in South Wilmington, Del., were destroyed by fire Thursday. Loss estimated at \$30,000.

Antonio Gatz, an Italian, about 26 years of age, was stabbed and killed early Thursday morning, in Hazleton, Pa., by two unknown men, who made their escape.

At the annual meeting of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad at Topeka, Kansas, Thursday, W. B. Strong was elected president, with a board of directors and other officers.

The Chicago and Alton and Rock Island Railroads will test in the courts the right of the eastern trunk lines to discriminate against it because of the payment of commissions to ticket agents.

The bill providing for the construction of an elevated or underground railroad in cities, subject to the control of councils, known as the rapid transit bill, passed the Pennsylvania House Thursday.

Eugene Creighton, of the United States training ship Saratoga, at Newport, R. I., is missing, and it is feared that he may have committed suicide in a fit of despondency under which he appeared to be laboring.

Commodore Schley, U. S. N., chief of the bureau of equipment and recruiting Thursday inspected the training ships Jamestown, Saratoga, Portsmouth, and New Hampshire, at Newport, R. I., and found them in good condition.

It is believed that Dr. Charles Bruil, who recently committed suicide in the county jail at Dodgeville, Wis., while under arrest for poisoning his wife, was Dr. John Bender, jr., a member of the notorious Bender family of murderers.

The residence of Jacob Wagener, near Tionesta, Pa., was robbed by five men Wednesday. Mrs. Wagener was in the house at the time, and was forced to tell where the money was.

A DEADLY SHOT-GUN. THREE NEGRO BOYS INSTANTLY KILLED AND TWO OTHERS WOUNDED. Three small negro boys were instantly killed and two others wounded, by a single discharge from a shot-gun yesterday morning about six o'clock.

Alex. Fillyaw, aged 13 years, killed. Charles Baker, aged 18 years, killed. Ed. Fillyaw, aged 14 years, seriously wounded.

Ben. Cronly, aged 13 years, slightly wounded. Fillyaw, Baker and Smith were killed instantly, the upper part of their bodies and their heads being perforated with shot.

The weapon which was used with such deadly effect was a common double-barrelled shot-gun. Only one barrel was discharged. It was loaded with a heavy charge of duck-shot.

Grant Best and the victims of his shot gun, together with other boys of about the same age, were employed to shoot rice birds on a plantation across the Point Peter. The boys named were seated on a log near the river waiting for a boat to take them over.

When he got within about thirty or forty feet of the group he pointed the gun at them and fired. Best says that he did not know that the gun was loaded. He had just borrowed it, and the man from whom he got it did not tell him that it was loaded.

Upon Best's discovery of the fatal results of his firing the gun he ran to the boys, exclaiming, "I did not do to do it." Some one came up and told him that he had better go for a doctor, and he started off in a run, and after summoning Dr. McDonald and Dr. Potter, went to the city hall, where he told the janitor that he had shot the three boys, and wanted to surrender himself.
