Mr. Kennedy: I don't know where you get that word intrinsically. In my county, after Wash. Bryan became President and began to infuse new life into it, the stock jumped from \$5.00 to \$16.00, and I opposed selling our county stock at these figure.

Mr. Bryan: The gentleman with all his astuteness in finances must be a novice in ascertaining the value of stock if he does not know that when runners are sent out to buy up stock it makes a demand for it and causes it to advance in price.
