NEWS NOTES Dr. H. W. Raveland, vice-consul, South Carolina District, died at Aiken in that State Saturday last. The flagship Trenton made a trial trip to sea from Fort Mifflin, Pa., Thursday with Admiral Jonathan Word. The strikers are resuming work in the coke region and by Monday it is expected that all the works will be in operation. There have been ten new cases of yellow fever at Key West, Fla., of the seventy cases now under treatment, sixty at least are children. A mortgage of \$1000 was executed in favor of the Maritime Trust Company of New York by the Pittsburg and Western Railroad Company, was recorded at New Castle, Pa., Tuesday. J. M. White, master of the Philadelphia Times Publishing Company, was Thursday held for court in the charge of embezzlement of between \$5000 and \$6000 of the funds of the company. United States Senator Chandler states he never wrote or inspired the letter recently attributed to him in which he was represented as favoring Blaine and Sherman in the Republican presidential ticket. Ex-Congressman Ash H. Gwyneth died at Georgetown, Ky., Thursday, after a lingering illness, from heart disease, aged 70. He was a relative of President Cleveland and a native of New York. John or James Thompson was arrested last Wednesday the passengers at Pittsburg, Wednesday night, was a party by the names of the jury. Thursday the evidence going to show that he had killed Woodson in 1874. Mrs. W. R. Mills, her two daughters and a son-in-law, went into the lake near Arden, on Wednesday night to bathe. One of the daughters got beyond her depth and the others went to her rescue. All except the younger daughter were drowned. Wm. Johnson, a desperado, shot and killed Baker, a saloon keeper, at Minncola, Texas, Tuesday night, and fled the country. The sheriff pursued him with bloodhounds and found the criminal in a swamp. He shot three of the dogs and one of the deputies but was finally captured and, without further ceremony, was lynched. Four people were shot at Clinton, Iowa, during the Wild West performance of Sile Bros. circus, Tuesday night. George Harrington, aged 17, was shot fatally. Mrs. W. A. Lambertson, dangerously ill. Wallace Phillips, aged 16, seriously. One of the Indians was also shot. The shooting was done during the encounter of the cowboys and Indians in the ring. Look out for Your Children.
