Mr. Geo. H. Roberts, cashier of the National Bank, returned from a Northern trip last night, looking much improved. He is one of the few cashiers who can go to Canada and return.

The Crops.
Mr. J. C. Parker from near Piney Grove, Jones county, called to see us yesterday and reports the crops as fine in his neighborhood. They have escaped the late heavy rains, up to Wednesday evening, and if nothing happens from now on will make a good crop.

Capt. K. R. Jones has just returned from a trip through lower Onslow and Jones and the western portion of Carteret. On the sound he says the corn crops are fine, and in portions of Onslow the cotton and corn both are very good, but in the White Oak section of Jones the excessive rains have greatly damaged the crops. Plows were stopped for nearly two weeks, and the cotton is small.

Steamer Movements.
The Vesper of the E. C. D. line arrived yesterday with good cargo of general merchandise, and will sail this afternoon at four o'clock. Capt. Hall of the Vesper reports very heavy weather in the sound on Wednesday, the storm being in the nature of a hurricane.

The Anolis of this line will arrive tomorrow morning.
The Margie of the Hyde county line rode the waves from Bayboro yesterday and arrived on time. She leaves tomorrow morning on a trip to Ocracoke and will get there in time for the closing of the camp meeting.

Our City Fathers.
It was generally thought that the members of the board of city council had arrived at an understanding by which they would have more harmony, and as councilmen endeavor to guard the welfare of the people regardless of personal feeling or previous political affiliations. But it seems that somebody was mistaken. The majority of the board, seeing their mistake in passing upon the bills collectively very promptly and properly receded from that position and showed a disposition to make such concessions as would bring harmony and good feeling, but they are not, we regret to say, met half way by the minority.

It is the right and duty of every member of the board to object to any bill that is not a proper one for the city to pay; but it is not right for three members out of eight to arrogate to themselves the right and power to reduce the salaries of the city officials fifty per cent. Unless they can show some good reason for such reduction the public will not sustain them. But perhaps they are like Jay Gould was on one occasion—"The public may be d-d." They very readily vote an increase of pay to certain employees because they cannot obtain cash for their vouchers. In this they do right, but at the same time they want to reduce others fifty per cent. This, to say the least, is inconsistent, and is not right.

The Jones County Farmers' Excursion.
We regret that our Jones county farmers were so unfortunate in the selection of a day for their excursion. The steamer Trent which was to have gone to Trenton on Wednesday to bring a part of them down was to have returned from a trip to Portsmouth on Tuesday night, but she did not return and up to this writing has not returned nor has anything been heard from her. It is presumed, however, that owing to the stormy weather that has prevailed in the sound for the last two or three days that the prudent captain would not venture out from Portsmouth. But it is safe to say that our Trenton friends who contemplated coming on the excursion were not disappointed much about the non-arrival of the boat if it rained in that section as it did here.

The Kingston went to Pollockville and brought down a small crowd of ladies and gentlemen, who seemed to enjoy the trip notwithstanding the rain. We suggest that the managers try again.

Almost a Riot.
The colored excursion from Norfolk yesterday came near terminating in a serious riot. The excursionists, some thousand in number, left here about 4:30 p. m., drinking and noisy, and after the train had gotten off a short time they compelled the engineer to return with the expressed determination to stay all night. Their conduct of defiance became so disorderly that the Mayor called on the Pasquotank Rifles to quell the disturbance. The Rifles quickly responded, prepared for ugly work, and when they appeared the serious aspect suppressed the disturbance. Four of the leaders were arrested, taken before Mayor Scott, preliminary evidence heard, and sent to jail, to be tried this morning.

Two considerations are suggested by the occurrence. First, the value to the town of the military company, and the importance of sustaining it to the full standard of members and equipment. Second, the duty of Manager King to send with these excursionists a police to preserve order. The Rifles, and the Rifles alone, preserved the town last night from serious disturbance and blood.

The Norfolk authorities were telegraphed to make further arrests upon arrival of train last night.—Elizabeth City Economist.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

AUG. 2ND, '87.
A regular meeting of the board of city council was held this evening, acting Mayor B. B. Lane, presiding. Present, councilmen R. P. Williams, J. V. Williams, V. A. Crawford, H. P. Kennedy, S. H. Lane, John Greer and M. P. Holly.

The petition of E. B. Hackburn asking permission to repair the building on west side of Alex. Miller's store was granted.

A. R. Dennison asked permission to erect a seed cotton house south of his gin house and connecting with it, three-stories high, to be covered with tin roof, also to enlarge boiler house. On motion of councilman J. V. Williams the petition was referred to the fire district committee to report back to the board.

Mrs. Calvin Perry asked permission to build piazza to house. Granted.

The finance committee reported that there had been no arrangements made for borrowing money to pay current expenses.

Councilman and treasurer J. V. Williams made a statement concerning the matter in which he said that the injunction had hindered the progress of arrangements that were being perfected.

Councilman S. H. Lane thought that the injunction had nothing to do with it and suggested that treasurer Williams resign and let some other man who can borrow the money take the place.

After considerable argument which councilman J. V. Williams characterized as a political strike at him, on motion of R. P. Williams the matter was referred to the finance committee and treasurer to report upon tomorrow night at 8 o'clock.

The sanitary committee reported the trash deposited on West street not to be in a very bad condition.

Councilman R. P. Williams moved that the Marshall should see Mr. Rhem and let him move it at once as there was complaint about its remaining there.

Councilman S. H. Lane reported the sewer leading from the court house to the river to be in bad condition.

Councilman Crawford moved that the sanitary committee be instructed to meet with the county commissioners and have the sewer repaired immediately or discontinued, and that the committee have power to act for the board.

Councilman Holly reported that a portion of George street was in bad condition. Referred to committee on streets and pumps with power to act.

Committee on streets and pumps reported sidewalk on east side of Craven street below South Front in bad condition. Councilman J. V. Williams moved that the owners of the property be allowed five days to repair the same and if not done the Marshall will be instructed to tear it up.

Councilman Kennedy moved that the hole on sidewalk on West street near Queen be repaired at once. Carried.

Councilman J. V. Williams moved that a lamp be placed on Federal alley at once, Mr. John Dunn to keep it lighted without charge. Adopted.

Councilman Kennedy moved that a lamp be placed at the corner of Norfolk and Crooked streets. Referred to committee on streets and pumps with power to act.

R. P. Williams moved that the pump near the sharp corner on Middle street be covered. Adopted.

R. P. Williams moved that the Marshall be instructed to overhaul the fire pumps and examine their condition. Adopted.

The cemetery committee reported the cemeteries in good condition.

Messrs. Ellis and Hilton of the Atlantic and New Berne Fire Companies asked the board to make some arrangements about paying the drivers of the companies. Referred to the meeting tomorrow night.

Councilman Holly moved to amend by requesting them to send in their bill tomorrow night. Motion as amended adopted.

W. W. Clark, attorney reported in regard to revising certain ordinances. Adopted.

Board took a recess to meet tomorrow night at 8:30 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY NIGHT, Aug. 3d.
Board reconvened at 8:30 o'clock, Mayor Meadows in the chair. Present Councilman R. P. Williams, J. V. Williams, B. B. Lane, V. A. Crawford, M. P. Holly and John Greer.

The finance committee reported that their efforts to borrow money had been unsuccessful.

Treasurer J. V. Williams stated that he had made several efforts to borrow money, but failed owing to dissension in the board.

Councilman Holly moved that the report of the finance committee be received. Adopted.

Councilman R. P. Williams moved that the engineers of the fire companies shall receive \$30.00 per month until paid cash, and the street hands \$1.00 per day until they can be paid cash. Adopted by a unanimous vote.

Councilman J. V. Williams moved to pay the interest now due on notes held by Green & Foy.

R. P. Williams moved to table. Lost.

Councilman Crawford moved to instruct the treasurer to pay other interest on same notes when due. Lost.

J. V. Williams's motion was adopted.

R. P. Williams moved to allow A. T. Stranbury's and T. J. Smalls' bills. Adopted.

F. H. A. J. A. Meadows asked permission to erect a shed in rear of old cotton factory. Granted.

Councilman S. H. Lane moved that the clerk be instructed to make out bill for \$40.00 against the county for cleaning out sewer and present the same for collection. Adopted.

The Marshal submitted the following report:

One-half of the above cost, \$30.25, was deducted for my cost.

Councilman R. P. Williams moved that money should be appropriated to pay the drivers of the fire companies by the week. Adopted.

Councilman R. P. Williams moved that a pump be put down at the corner of Craven and Neuse streets. Referred to committee on streets and pumps with power to act.

On motion of R. P. Williams an appropriation of \$48.00 was made to pay the drivers of the fire companies for the month of August. Adopted by unanimous vote.

On motion the board adjourned.
