Trade and Travel.

From an extract republished from the Goldsboro Argus, it will be seen that some new arrangements of steamboats and railroads are contemplated by the managers of the N. S. Railroad, the E. C. D. line of steamers, and the A. & N. C. Railroad. This, we hope, means a more convenient communication for passengers between the Pamlico and Neuse river sections and the N. S. Railroad. Trade and travel are natural companions and go together or follow each other, and it is a serious inconvenience when the facilities of travel between New Berne and Elizabeth City, furnished by the old Dominion Co., were suspended. The E. C. D. line furnishes ample facilities for freight, but travel over the line is forbidden. This is a great inconvenience to the people of Albemarle and Pamlico sections, and should be remedied, and we hope the meeting of the managers of the lines in Goldsboro, and which the Argus regards as significant of new developments that may lead to a restoration of communication between the sections—Economic.

Uneasiness in Charleston.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Aug. 30.—As the anniversary of the great earthquake approaches the alarm and excitement increases. This is added to by the frequent recurrence of shocks. Three have occurred between 11 p. m. Sunday and 6 a. m. Monday. These were felt in Summerville, Augusta, Columbia and at other points in the northern portion of the State. The disturbance was very slight in Charleston, which would indicate that the centre of trouble is moving northward. Nevertheless, excitement here is very great. Large numbers of white people have left the city in summer excursions. The negroes are greatly demoralized, holding nightly prayer meetings in churches and a great many conversions occurring nightly. Household labor is utterly demoralized. Among whites a vague feeling of uneasiness prevails, but there is no interruption to business of any kind. Until 31st of August passes there will be no abatement of this uneasiness.
