SOUTHERN BUSINESS.

The Bright and Gratifying Prospects of the Future of Southern Industries.

CHATTANOOGA, TENN., Sept. 25.—The Tradesman, in its quarterly review of the Southern industrial situation says:

"The past three months, although and embarrassing midsummer period, shows no cessation in wonderful industrial development in all sections of the South. While speculation have been restricted, material growth has correspondingly increased, and reports to the Tradesman from the commercial and industrial centres of the South betoken a most gratifying condition of affairs. The crops everywhere in the South are above the average, and the general volume of business is increased. Up to a fortnight ago money was easy, and while collections are some what slower now, the movement of the crops will improve the financial situation. is very active, and manufacturers are crowded with orders, and the iron works are running on double time. Railroad building is in active progress in many of the Southern States, and the rolling mills in Chattanooga and Birmingham have orders for months ahead. Returns from Southern cotton mills show important improvement, the consumption of cotton having increased over 20,000 bales in the past twelve months, or nearly five and one-half per cent. The total number of mills, up to September 1st, 1887, was 249; the number of spindles 1,213,346; number of looms 27,963; cotton consumed per year 401,452 bales. New companies are being rapidly formed. In the past three months thirty-two new factories have been organized, divided as follows: Alabama 3, Arkansas 1, Georgia 2, Louisiana 2, North Carolina 12, South Carolina 3, Tennessee 2, Texas 7.

Southern iron masters have been greatly perplexed over the scarcity of coke, but this problem is being solved by important development in this branch. In the past three months twelve coke companies have been formed—4 in Alabama, 4 in Tennessee, 2 in Virginia and 2 in West Virginia—and many others are in process of formation. The work is rapidly progressing on new blast furnaces in process. In the past quarter 11 new furnace companies were organized: five in Georgia, 3 in Mississippi, 1 in Tennessee, 1 in Virginia and 1 in West Virginia. One of the features in the past quarter has been the remarkable development in gold and silver mining. Much attention is being paid to this industry, and vastly improved methods of mining are being adopted. In the past three months fifteen smelting works have been erected in Arkansas and 31 mining and quarrying companies formed. In all the Southern States, much capital is being expended in search for natural gas, none has been found in paying quantities, but prospectors are greatly encouraged. In the past quarter 31 natural gas and oil companies have been formed in Alabama, 3 in Arkansas, 3 in Kentucky, 9 in Tennessee, 8 in Texas, 5 in Virginia. In the past quarter the wood-working establishments formed in the South, exclusive of saw-mills are: in Alabama 22, Arkansas 10, Florida 1, Georgia 10, Kentucky 4, Louisiana 3, Mississippi 3, North Carolina 13, South Carolina 1, Tennessee 9, Texas 1, Virginia 3 and West Virginia 3. Eighty-seven railroad companies have been incorporated in the last three months, of which Alabama has 8, Arkansas 12, Florida 6, Georgia 21, Kentucky 4, Louisiana 2, Mississippi 2, North Carolina 6, South Carolina 1, Tennessee 10, Texas 7, Virginia 3 and West Virginia 5.

Among the general companies formed in the past quarter are 28 brick-works, 26 electric light works, 31 steel railway companies and 29 foundry and machine shops. They are pretty evenly divided among all the States. Five glass-factories have been organized—2 in Alabama, 2 in Tennessee, and 1 in Georgia.

A great diversity of other industries have been found, among them 48 flour and grist-mills, of which 14 were in North Carolina and 11 in Texas; steel-works 1, saw-mills 91, water-works companies 29, coal and ore mines and quarries 133, miscellaneous, including land and development companies and miner industries, 133."

Charlotte Chronicle: Burt Williams, colored, who was employed as a fireman on the Carolina Central road, was shot and killed at a colored festival at Laurinburg last Saturday night. Wilson had a "layover" at Laurinburg Saturday, and as there was a festival in town that night, he concluded to take it in. During the progress of the festivities two colored men became involved in a row and one of them drew a pistol and fired at his antagonist. The bullet missed its mark, but struck Williams in the eye, killing him instantly.

State Immigration Agent Patrick is sending out letters containing a seductive offer from Dr. W. R. Capehart, of Avoca, to the editors of the State. The letters contain a proposition from Mr. Capehart to give to each editor in the State a building lot in Avoca, the eastern Carolina winter and sporting resort. It is proposed that each editor in exchange for the lot, give a small space in his advertising columns, one half of which is to be devoted to advertising the State and its resources, and the other half to advertising the resort itself. The main object is to develop the resources of eastern Carolina, and it is thought that capital in abundance can be had for that purpose if capitalists can be brought into the section and shown the many fine openings for nearly everything, only waiting for money to develop them. Besides this all the editors, who are proverbially shallow-pocketed, can have a cottage and home of their own at the head of the famous and beautiful Albemarle sound, where they can repair either in summer or in winter for rest and recreation.
