The Onslow Railroad.

The board of commissioners for this county met in adjourned session yesterday to consider the request of the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina Railroad Company for the release to the company of the old plank road extending from Serrantheath street to the Fender county line. A committee from the board of commissioners of the railroad company was present. The matter was discussed for some time and finally on motion of commissioner B. G. Worth, for the consideration of the proposed release of the road was deferred until the company shall have definitely determined upon the line of the railroad.

At the meeting held in Grant township, Fender county, last Saturday, resolutions were adopted authorizing a subscription of \$10,000 by the township, to aid in the extension of the road. The question of "subscription" will be submitted to the voters of the township at an election to be held today. Up to 12 o'clock on Saturday there had been \$19,000 subscribed, out of a voting strength of 1887-1888.

Railroad Extension-The Mass Meeting on Tuesday Night

A large number of citizens of Craven county assembled at the court house on Tuesday night to discuss the proposition to extend the A. & N. C. R. to some point on the C. F. & Y. V. R.

The meeting was called to order by S. W. Latham, Esq., who moved that Mr. Geo. Allen be called to the chair. The motion was unanimously adopted. H. S. Nunn was elected secretary.

The chairman stated the object of the meeting. Mr. J. J. Wolfenden stated that the matter was one of great importance to New Berne and this section; that he saw present merchants, lawyers, doctors and many of other trades, and professions from whom we could have full expression of opinion. There was one present who had long favored the scheme of connecting the A. & N. C. R. with the C. F. & Y. V. R. Hon. C. E. Clark, and he would like to hear his views on the subject.

Mr. Clark was loudly applauded and responded in a speech of some length. He rejected the proposition of connecting the A. & N. C. R. with the C. F. & Y. V. R. He said that the material interest, however important, is without those their own interests in the past, would prove fruitless. The connection of the A. & N. C. R. with the C. F. & Y. V.
