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**DIFFERENCE OF OPINION.**

The Morganton Advertiser, a monthly paper recently started at Morganton, in its October number gives its opinion of North Carolina journalism, which is very favorable in its general reference, but gives a back handed lick at one of the newest and best edited papers in the State. It says:

Strange as it may seem, Raleigh, our capital, is unable to produce a daily of either political or literary merit. The leading daily there would be considered ordinary muddling in a market glutted with mediocrity. We are glad to note, however, that it has discarded its "pot metal" department and we hope for still further improvements.

This sounds a little singular when one of the very papers mentioned in the same article as a credit to the State uses "pot metal" quite extensively. The News and Observer, the leading daily in the State, is published at Raleigh and gives what the people principally want in a newspaper—the news. Its editorials too on political questions are generally sound and conservative. But people will differ in opinion and we think a very large number in North Carolina will differ with the Advertiser in its estimate of the News and Observer.

**Shame Upon Us.**

We can grow successfully within the borders of our highly favored State, corn, wheat, oats, barley, rye, buckwheat, rice, cotton, hemp, flax, jute, silk, tobacco, peanuts, sorghum cane, broom corn, millet lucerne, clover, orchard, timothy and herds grass, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, hops, peas, melons, strawberries, cranberries, apples, peaches, grapes, plums, cherries, &c., &c., and yet we find people confining their labor and care to the production of single crops to the exclusion of all others. And these crops frequently cost more to produce than the price for which they are sold. And the worst feature of this suicidal and ruinous policy is, that the producer has no more control over the price than a child. How helpless! How poor! How dependent and servile we must be so long as this mad course is pursued.—Progressive Farmer.

**Railroad Subscription.**

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Oct. 11.—The subscription of fifty thousand dollars to the C. K. & W. R. R. was carried in Transylvania county by a large majority—785 to 84. The Buncombe county commissioners yesterday submitted a proposition for a railroad bond subscription to the vote of the people. The election will be held November 19th. The proposition gives one hundred thousand dollars to the Carolina Central, two hundred thousand to the C. K. & W. and one hundred thousand to the Asheville & Burnsville R. R.; the bonds to be issued only on the completion of the roads and to bear 4 per cent. interest, payable in thirty years.—News and Observer.

**STATE NEWS.**

**Roanoke News:** Four prisoners, all colored, and all awaiting trial at the ensuing term of the Superior Court broke jail at Halifax on Sunday afternoon last, and escaped, though efforts were made to recapture them.

**Wilmington Star:** Grant township voted a subscription of ten thousand dollars to the Wilmington, Onslow & East Carolina Railroad, at the election held last Tuesday. It is said that only one vote was cast "against subscription."

**Durham Tobacco Plant:** Mr. John M. Green was shot in the face by a companion while out hunting birds. Mr. Green was on one side of the branch, Mr. Linticum on the other, a bird flew up, Mr. Linticum fired, not seeing Mr. Green, and emptied nearly the whole charge in his face. The wound is painful, but not dangerous.

**News and Observer:** During the last twelve months, thirty-three cotton factories were established in the South, twelve of them in North Carolina. The average dividend on investment for all the mills has been about 20 per cent. and yet there are good business men in Raleigh who seem to think that a cotton factory would not pay here—at least they don't build one. Isn't it funny? Think about it, business men.

**Greene County Enterprise:** Some of the farmers in the neighborhood of Hull Road Church met last week and organized a "Farmer's Club." This is a move in the right direction, for it is only through organized efforts that any class or body of men can attain success, and it seems to us that if there is any class of people that ought to be organized it is the farming class—the backbone and the sinew of the land.

**Greenville Reflector:** A destructive fire occurred upon the plantation of Col. Harry Skinner, upon which Mr. A. J. Moore lives, one afternoon last week. The stables and barn were burned, destroying the carts, wagons and farm implements of the plantation, besides ten tons of hay, a quantity of corn and fodder and several head of team. The fire is supposed to have originated from combustion caused by the curing hay. Loss about \$2,000 with no insurance.

**Smithfield Herald:** Andrew Gildrest, colored, of Richmond county, this State, was arrested here Tuesday night charged with stealing ten dollars in greenbacks from another colored man named D. W. Sackey, who lives at Dudley, Wayne county. The accused was tried Wednesday morning by W. B. Surles, J. P., who after hearing the evidence, in default of bail committed him to jail. He was searched by the jailor and the ten dollar bill found on his person, after which he confessed to have taken the money. Up to that time he protested his innocence.

**Wilson Advance:** The barn of Mr. W. H. Pope, who lives between Dunn and Godwin's, was destroyed by fire last Tuesday morning about light. No clue as to the origin of the fire. Fortunately Mr. Pope had not gathered his corn, the loss therefore is very light, outside of the building, which was not very costly. No insurance.—A little ten year old son of Mr. James Spencer, near Dunn, was bitten by a moccasin last week on his foot. Shortly afterwards a live chicken was cut open and applied to the foot that was bitten, and five little snakes were thereby drawn from the wound inflicted by the snake. Mr. A. J. Turlington, of Averasboro, has the little snakes.

**Goldsboro Argus:** The notorious "moonshiner" Mal Roberson, who has defied the officers of the law and eluded arrest for to these many years, has at length been captured by Mr. H. P. Dorch and is now in jail in this city awaiting a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Cogdell.—Two more "moonshiners" were yanked in-by Deputy Collector H. P. Dorch in the swamps of Lenoir county Monday night together with a large still and fixtures. The names of the captured two are Ergbert and Harvey Waler, brothers. They gave bond in Kinston for their appearance at next term of the U. S. District Court.—Yesterday a negro named Dock Whitley was sent to jail for committing an outrage upon Emma Hamilton, a little eight year old colored girl. The outrage occurred in the Patetown section of this county, and has greatly aroused the indignation of the people of that section. The case will be tried next week in the Superior Court.
