A Plan to Connect the A. & N. C. and C. F. & Y. V. Railroads.

Let the connecting link between Goldsboro and Fayetteville of railroad be built by the A. & N. C. Railroad using its present property and each section as a basis of credit to raise the necessary money. The distance to Sanford is about sixty-seven miles making the entire line when completed to that point one hundred and sixty-three miles in length. The cost of the construction is estimated, without interest, seventy-five hundred thousand per mile or say about two hundred thousand dollars. The mortgage debt of the present road is three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars which when added to the proposed new loan would make a total indebtedness of eight hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars or about five cents and per mile as against thirty-three cents per mile as present. Only an increase of seven cents per mile would be required.

When the money is raised by the sale of 250 miles of bonds to the C. F. & Y. V. R. R. a period of thirteen years will elapse until the expiration of the term of a bond issue of the N. C. R. R. of the A. & N. C. R. R. is reached. It is suggested that the interest on these bonds be paid for the A. & N. C. R. R. with a portion of the interest on the bonds of the C. F. & Y. V. R. R. which is now paid to the State. We think it is a fair suggestion that the interest on the bonds of the A. & N. C. R. R. be paid for the C. F. & Y. V. R. R. for the first five years of the term of the bonds. This would be a fair arrangement for the C. F. & Y. V. R. R. to make.
