New Berne's Shipping.

A correspondent discusses today the importance of New Berne's controlling and owning her shipping. The position of the Journal has long since been given on this point. We have several times pointed out the mistake our people made in not moving with the tide when the traffic was transferred from the sail boat to the steamer and built steamers of their own for their carrying trade. But as they failed to do this we can but welcome those who come to give us such transportation facilities as our commercial necessities demand. If these do not give such accommodations and facilities as we need, or if their freight charges are excessive and calculated to cripple the business of the city, then in self-defense the business men of the city will be bound to take matters into their own hands.

It is not for the Journal to say whether or not such a condition of things now exist that the business men ought to take steps to secure to the city the profits arising from the service of carrying and bringing freights. It is a matter for them to consider. We feel sure, however, that a system of through freights whereby cotton is taken to Norfolk from points above here, as was recently the case, for less money than the same is brought to New Berne, is detrimental to our market and trade and should be remedied if possible.

New Berne—Importance of Controlling Her Own Shipping.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—Our people seem to be worked up on the railroad question. They have awakened to a sense of their duty. But now don't let us forget while we are stretching our arm westward and seeking to improve our condition, we should also look after our water routes and improve our commerce. I will remember when the trade between this place and Baltimore was anything but what it is now. The schooner Agie and H. Hill built up a trade and was doing well. But alas! Baltimoreans having an eye to business put the little Agie and H. Hill had to seek another refuge, and the business has been built up to one of great magnitude. It speaks for itself. There are three lines of steamers running to this place and none of them seem willing to quit. Now, Mr. Editor, to whom do these lines of steamers belong? Do any of them hall from New Berne? Does New Berne own any interest in them? No! We, sir, should look after this revenue and let it be divided among our own citizens and give our own people employment. We have the men, as good as ever paced the deck of a ship or crossed the ocean. One of these lines, a foreign company, not satisfied with the route between here and Baltimore, has built a small boat that is expected here soon to ply on the waters of the Neuse—to drive our river steamers out of the waters, and like the Agie and H. Hill to say to them, get out of our way for we own this route and we will have it. Now, Mr. Editor, under what obligation are our people to this rich foreign corporation? Do we belong to them? How long shall these things be?

Let every business man of New Berne and of the county of Craven come to the rescue and own our boats. We have the mechanics, and as we have said before we have the men, and the business is ours by right of both and does not belong to any foreigners, most especially those who have never been our friends neither in the past or present. The race is not always to the swift nor the battle to the strong. But the people who own this trade should control it if they will. Let them put their shoulder to the wheel and keep the money at home, thereby building up our town and enhancing all interest, the contrary of which makes the rich foreigner richer and the poor home man poorer. As charity should commence at home we having the advantages of the water route as patriotic citizens should profit by it. Some nations live by their commerce, but we have paid little or no attention to ours. We must awake to a sense of our duty and take that which belongs to us.

Fire at Stevens, Lancaster county Pa., Tuesday morning destroyed McKee's cigar factory with a large quantity of cigars. Loss \$100,000. A Howie's implement store and a barber shop, loss \$10,000, partially insured.

The steamship Fulte, which arrived at New York Tuesday, brought Andrew Carnegie, and a delegation of members of both houses of Parliament, who have been appointed by the Peace Association of Great Britain to wait upon the President.

A rough statement of the affairs of H. Webster & Co., wholesale dealers in liquors, at Nos. 25 and 29 Broad street New York, shows liabilities \$23,000 assets \$213,000, net surplus \$23,000. They have \$300,000 in merchandise and \$400,000 in book accounts.

A meeting of clergymen of different denominations to the number of 100, was held in New York Tuesday, to devise means by which the traffic in liquor on the Sabbath might be prevented. A committee was appointed to call a public meeting to take action on the subject.

Henry S. Little of Trenton, N. J., publishes a fifteen column reiteration of his charges against Senator McPherson of bargaining to secure the election of Gen. Sewell as Senator in return for business favors. Mr. Little declares that Senator McPherson ought to shoot him (Little) if the charges are not proved.

A fire broke out in the packing department of Adams & Co.'s glass works in Petersburg, Tuesday afternoon. The entire glass works plant, a row of tenements, two brick dwellings, three small stables and a portion of Jackson's livery stables were consumed. A number of other dwellings were damaged. Loss estimated at \$50,000.

An east bound passenger train on the Wabash road, with a large number of passengers aboard, had a narrow escape from destruction, Sunday night. Just before the Long bridge, near North Morene, Mich., was reached, the engineer made the discovery that the structure was on fire, and succeeded in stopping his train.

About 7,000 persons assembled in Union square, New York, last night, to protest against the action of the police in dispersing the meeting of the progressive labor party on the 8th inst. Resolutions were adopted in which the police were denounced for clubbing workmen, while they allowed the roughs who were trying to break up the meeting to go scot free.

The Virginia Habeas Corpus Cases.

A dispatch to the Sun from Washington last night says: "In the United States Supreme Court today, after the transaction of some routine business, Solicitor General Jenks presented to the court the return of the United States marshal for the eastern district of Virginia to the writ of habeas corpus issued in the case of Attorney General Ayres and two Commonwealth attorneys of that State, and announced that the marshal and the prisoners were in the court room. Mr. Jenks contended that the court fix a day for the hearing of argument upon the questions in controversy, and that meanwhile the prisoners be admitted to bail. The Chief Justice asked Mr. Jenks if he was ready for the argument. Mr. Jenks replied that he was not. What the questions he set out in the return were very grave and that he himself did not take upon himself to argue in the lower court and that he and other counsel for the prisoners would like to have time enough to prepare themselves before the argument. He made several suggestions for the day, but the Chief Justice said that he would fix a day for the hearing. Mr. Jenks then withdrew.
