ital importance A farmer of experience stated to the writer that he planted a lifteen acrefield, with five acres cash of field pear. corn and sweet potatoes. The corn was gathered at the usual time, the peaswere nicked and the vines allowed t rot on the ground. The sweet potator were dug in the tober, and the vines left on the ground. The entire fifteen acres were ploughed during March and planted in cotton, using Commercial Fertilizer.

There was a marked difference during the whole season in the size and appearance of the cotton, and also in the yield The portion on which peas had been grown the previous year produced nearly as much lint cotton as was produced on both the corn and potato land The corn land gave nearly twice as much as the potato land. What was the cause? Does a sweet potato crop im poverish the land? It is evident that the pea crop benefited and manufed the land, and left it in fine condition for a cotton crop. The corn crop did not im-prove the land, and the potato crop seems to have actually damaged it, alused in growing the potatoes, while no manure was used with the peas, and only a small quantity on the corn land. both returned to the land.

It is the opinion of the writer that the cause of damage by sweet potatoes is the necessity of turning up the land in October or November and leaving it open and loose during the fall and winter, subject to the sun, wind and rain. Would not a covering of pine straw spread at once on the land prevent the

Another farmer states that he had a field covered with grass and weeds; he plowed a strip an acre wide across the field from corner to corner early in November, and was prevented from completing the breaking until February. The next and the succeeding crops showed the effect of the fall plowing by smaller weed and diminished cotton crop on the portion plowed in November. Is fall plowing in this climate ever beneficial, unless it is made for a small grain crop?
