Send Another Invitation.

At the last annual Conference the church at New Berne extended an invitation, and it only lacked a few votes of being accepted. If an invitation is extended this year it will in all probability be accepted. It has been seventeen years since this body assembled in New Berne. It is perhaps the largest representative body of Christians that convenes once a year.
Our Methodist brethren would doubtless receive the hearty co-operation of all our citizens in their efforts to entertain this body, and we hope therefore an earnest invitation will be extended.

PUBLIC MEETING.

October 26, 1887.
On motion of Hon. F. M. Simmons, H. S. Nunn was elected chairman, and R. Hancock, jr., secretary.
The chairman stated the object of the meeting in a few well selected remarks.
Mr. John Long being called upon addressed the meeting in favor of a Coast Line Railroad, showing conclusively the benefits that would derive to our people and this section of North Carolina, and proving the necessity for our citizens to move and take immediate action to secure this great improvement.

Hon. F. M. Simmons being called stated he responded to the call for the purpose of making a motion and not a speech. Thereupon moved that the chair appoint a committee of five to make arrangements for an adjourned meeting.

B. W. Morris having been called stated that he had only heard of the object of the meeting within the past few days and had not given the matter much thought, but did think it the duty of every citizen to do all he could for any object that would benefit our community.

Mr. C. E. Jay moved to amend Mr. Simmons' motion by making the committee twenty five instead of five, and the committee be instructed to draft resolutions to present to the adjourned meeting. The amendment was rejected.

Mr. Bushlee of Raleigh being present was requested to give his views of the present condition of his and other sections of the State. He said he did not like to advise any community to impose a tax upon themselves but he would say that but few places were prosperous but had to burden themselves with a debt, and he did consider this movement a necessary one to New Berne and Craven county, and he thought that the people here ought and should favor this movement.

Mr. Simmons' motion was seconded by Mr. E. K. Bryan.

The motion was carried and the meeting adjourned until Friday night.

A Democrat's Views.

EDITOR JOURNAL—I have before me your article of Sunday last on the return of the delegates from Raleigh, in which you say the Governor intends to turn the State over to his successor as he received it. We beg leave to differ with you. If you had been one of the committee you would have been convinced that the Governor has a policy for the road, or to speak plainer, there is a deal on foot to turn this road over to the W. & W., as soon as it is newly ironed to Goldsboro. Do not understand that the Governor said it in so many words, but from hearing him express himself as fully as he did, the writer came to that conclusion, and other members of the committee were of the same opinion.

The Governor would not state what disposition he proposes to make of this road, which is proof positive to the writer he fears, and to make it stronger, knows, this disposition he proposes to make will not suit the parties along the line of the road, nor will it be to the advantage of the county stock. You say his predecessor never extended the road, etc., and why should he? The writer should think any Governor of a State would like for historians, when they come to chronicle the time he was Governor, to be able to point to one act that was of good to the State, or some section, and not be compelled to simply state, "Governor was elected in 1884, was inaugurated and served his term." You suggest that the people remain quiet until the next election. This is a matter we can not let rest. The future of this city and the welfare of all the counties bordering on both sounds, depend on this extension. We are completely shut off at this time by the R. & D. and W. & W. at Goldsboro. We can not expect any prosperity as long as this condition remains, and if the Governor can turn us over to the W. & W. they will use us as a feeder and nothing more. We should agitate this question in and out of season, and keep hammering until we succeed, and if we can not accomplish the connection before the coming election, we should know if the future Governor favors our proposition. We can not afford to take chances again, as the railroads of the State have become so powerful that the Governors fear to go contrary to their wishes, especially if they wish to go to Congress from districts through which the associate railroad runs.
