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The last number of the Tobacco Plant contains a twenty-two column article on Church and State in their relation to education in North Carolina, from the pen of Dr. A. W. Mangum of the State University. We have not yet read it, but feel prepared to say in advance that it is an able paper on a most important subject.

NOT FREE WHISKEY BILL STILL TAXATION.
 Do the people of North Carolina want whiskey to be free? We do not believe they do. On a question of this nature a large majority would oppose any suggestion of free whiskey. Between free whiskey and free liquor there would be few to hesitate—Tarboro's attorney. Who ever thought of wanting whiskey free in North Carolina? The people of North Carolina are not fools. The cry of "free whiskey, free chaw," and all such blundering nonsense when it is proposed to abolish an odious and unnecessary tax does not prevent the people from knowing that the State can tax these articles and collect the money with her own officers and place it in her own treasury where it is needed for the education of our childen and other necessary expenses of State government. The United States government does not need the money collected from this source, and every dollar drawn from North Carolina is locked up in the treasury at Washington or paid out to pensioners. It is a drain upon the people of the State for which they get nothing in return. The government should raise its revenue by duties on imports and any man of ordinary intelligence knows that the repeal of the internal revenue laws will not abolish the duties on imported whiskey and tobacco.

AN ITEM FOR GOVERNOR SCALDS.
 A merchant of New Bern received from Salem, N. C. a few days ago two barrels of common clay pipes, the freight on which was \$1.35 per barrel. The freight on the same from Baltimore, nearly three times the distance, would have been twenty cents per barrel. We call the Governor's attention to this little matter to further satisfy him if possible that the great railroad corporations doing business in this State have "divided the empire," and in the terms of division it has been decreed that there shall be no traffic between the people east of Goldsboro and those west of that point. All community of interest is destroyed and we are forced to go North for even clay pipes when they are made in our own State.

New Bern with her cheap water routes ought to supply a large portion of eastern and middle N. C. with their heavy groceries, and would do it but for the railroad corporations who are interested in building up other points. We sought to free ourselves from such influences by a connection with the O. F. & Y. V. R., but the Governor prefers to foster the interests of those who oppress us. Let us appeal to the next General Assembly to accept the proposition of the O. F. & Y. V. to buy the A. N. O. B.

The "Rescue" of Captain John Smith.
 The Indians especially admired bravery and cunning. This device of the white chieftain and his valor when attacked appealed to their admiration, and there was great desire to see him.

The renowned prisoner was received with the customary chorus of Indian yells; and then, acting upon the leading Indian custom, the law of unbounded hospitality, a bountiful feast was set before him. The captive, like valiant man he was, ate heartily, though ignorant what his fate might be.

The Indians wantonly killed their captives. When a sufficient number had been sacrificed to avenge the memory of such braves as had fallen in fight, the remaining captives were either adopted as tribesmen or disposed of as slaves.

So valiant a warrior as this pale faced *caucous* was too important a personage to be used as a slave, and Wa-bun so na cook, the chief, received him as an honored guest rather than as a prisoner, kept him in his own house for two days, and adopting him as his own son, promised him a large gift of land.

Then, with many expressions of friendship, he returned him, well escorted by Indian guides, to the trail that led direct back to the English colony at Jamestown.

This relation destroys the long famed romance of the doughty captain's life being saved by "the King's" own daughter, but it seems to be the only true version of the story, based upon his own original report.

But though the old described "rescue" did not save the pale, the valiant Englishman's situation was speedily drawn to the little Indian god, M-t-s-o-ka, whom his father called "his tombey," or *ghost*.

She was as impetuous as any young girl, savage or civilized, and she was so full of kindly attentions to the captain, and bestowed on him so many smiles and looks of wondering curiosity, that Smith made much of her, and in return, gave her some trifling presents and asked her name.

Now it was one of the many singular customs of the American Indians never to tell their own names, nor even to allow them to be spoken to strangers by any of their own immediate kindred. The reason for this lay in their peculiar superstition, which held that the speaking of one's real name gave to the stranger to whom it was spoken a magical and harmful influence over such person.

For this very reason, Wa-bun so na cook was known to the colonists by the name of his tribe, Pow-hatan, rather than by his own name. So, when he was asked his little daughter's name, he hesitated, and then gave in reply the nickname by which he often called her, Poc-ca-hun-tas, the "little tomboy."
