### NEWS NOTES

Fourteen persons were made dangerously ill in Pittsburg by bad milk, and three of them came near dying, but they are all recovering.

John C. Eno, the fugitive New York bank president, has purchased the residence at Lake Beauport, Quebec, which he occupied last summer for \$20,000.

In Buffalo, N. Y., Thursday, J. Hamlin drove his two famous mares, Bell Hamlin and Justina, a mile in 2:18. Mr. Hamlin weighs 175 pounds and is 65 years old, and the wagon weighs 135 pounds.

The New York Chamber of Commerce at its meeting Thursday adopted a series of resolutions favoring the peaceful settlement of the Canadian fishery question between Great Britain and this country.

Joseph Fuller, a seaman in the United States navy, residing at Newburyport, Mass., has been allowed a pension for total blindness from Oct. 27, 1863, payable at the Boston agency. The first payment is \$10.00.

A certificate was filed in the county clerk's office at New York Thursday setting forth that the Western Union Telegraph Company, through its directors, has increased its capital \$5,000,000. This makes the total stock \$50,000,000.

A fire at Old City, Va., Wednesday night destroyed a splendid structure, a school, foundry, the engine house and but works the army of Company 19 N. C. Pennsylvania, and a part of Trax A. Farmer wagon shop. Loss \$20,000, partly insured.

William M. Jensen, alias Virgo M. J. Rose, a member of the Knights of Labor, committed suicide in New York Wednesday night. Letters found on his person show that he was driven to this deed by starvation. He had had little work since last New Year.

The negotiations for the sale of the New York Graphic have been concluded, and a syndicate of wealthy capitalists in New York and Philadelphia have finally secured control of the paper. This arrangement will keep the Graphic an independent democratic journal and the friend of the national and State administrations.

The Chicago Railway Age during the last months the work of railway building has been going in the United States at a rate never before equaled. From January 1 to November 1, 274 roads have laid a total of 9,408 miles of track. More track has been laid so far this year than in the year 1886, and exceeds the record of all other years in this or any other country.

At Newport, R. I., Thursday, during the torpedo experiments, while a spar torpedo was being run out from a boat in which were seven or eight officers and men, it suddenly exploded before it had been immersed in the water. The shock was tremendous, starting the city and shaking the buildings along the harbor front. The boat was badly stove and the men had to use much exertion to reach the wharf before she sank. Two of the men were badly injured.

**The Strike in Louisiana.**  
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 3.—A special to the Times-Democrat from Jeanerette, La., says: "Capt. Cade tonight received an order to proceed to Pattersonville at once with a force of 30 men."

A special to the Times-Democrat from Baton Rouge says: "Quite a stir was created here this afternoon by the receipt of orders by the Baton Rouge Fenicians and the West Baton Rouge Delta Rifles to assemble, armed and equipped and hold themselves in readiness for marching orders."

A special to the Picoyune from New Iberia, La., says: "This morning was the time fixed for the strikers to choose between returning to work and leaving the plantations. Some of them returned to work, while others left, bag and baggage. Every mill in the Fauss Point country is running full blast and making good headway. The laborers seem satisfied with a dollar per day, and show no disposition to take part in the strike. News comes from the interior, west of here, that all is working smoothly."

### FOREIGN NEWS

**DUBLIN, Nov. 3.**—The cell in Tallamore jail which Mr. O'Brien has been placed in is eight feet long and six feet wide. He slept last night on a plank bed. He has given warning to the governor of the jail that he will refuse to do mental officers, wear the prison garb or associate with criminals. The governor will wait official notification from the general prison board before enforcing their decision that Mr. O'Brien should be treated as an ordinary prisoner. Mr. O'Brien is in cheerful spirits. He still wears civilian clothes.

United Ireland characterizes the removal of Mr. O'Brien to Tallamore jail as an outrage. Henceforth, it says, the people will make the landlord's hostage for Mr. O'Brien's safety. The plan of campaign will become not merely the tenable weapon of defence, but an instrument of vengeance. It says if Mr. O'Brien is harmed for every hair of his head Irishmen will exact its punishment.

**VIENNA, Nov. 3.**—The Political correspondence confirms the report of Russian military activity on the frontier. The same paper asserts that the agricultural and commercial crisis is increasing throughout the empire. As an instance it mentions the fact that the agrarian bank of Moscow recently put up at auction 400 estates. For what it was impossible to pay the interest on the mortgage.
