In regard to submitting the question to the people which was urged to be done within a very short time and the board of commissioners virtually to cause the property of the people of Craven county to be mortgaged for an immense amount of money, certainly required time for consideration and an expression of the opinion of the taxpayers of the county.

There are a large class of these tax payers whose voices cannot be heard before the board of commissioners nor their votes received at the ballot-box.

Many of those whose earthly posses sions consist of the home which shelters them, and the only time their voice can be heard in the affairs of the county is when the sheriff or his deputy calls on them for their taxes. These people are to come not in conflict with the major ity of those who vote and who control the election in this county, but they have quietly to submit to any decision which may be made by those who in an election contest are their superiors.

The property of these people is entrusted for protection to the board of COMMISSION MERCHANTS, county commissioners, and recreant to their trust will they be if they allow it to be jeopardized.

It has been stated that no convict labor shall be employed in the construction of the road, that all work shall be given to our own people.
