A Gigantic Stride Forward.

OXFORD, N. C., Nov. 12, 1887.—A few evenings ago a number of the most prominent citizens of our town met and organized a body known as the "Commonwealth."

One thing is worthy of comment. At the meeting, which represented only a small part of the citizens, \$2,220 was raised to be given as a bonus to a capitalist who will erect in our town a hotel at a given cost.

The committees on the above named business are now corresponding with noted capitalists, who, we are assured, are willing and anxious to give us gas, water and electricity, provided the town will do its part, and thus we are determined to do.

There is also a movement on foot for leasing the right of hunting on a large tract of country near Oxford and posting it. This is to be thoroughly stocked with various kinds of game, and made a hunting ground for Northern and other visitors.

The town hall and market house are progressing rapidly, and will vie with any in the State.

The tobacco market is in an unusually flourishing condition, last week's sales being probably larger than we have ever had in any one week.

The O. & C. R. R. is rapidly approaching completion. We open wide the portals of our town and extend to each and every good citizen a cordial and hearty welcome.

The church was densely packed last night by the assembled congregation to hear the introductory sermon by Rev. H. W. Battle, of Wadesboro.

THE LADIES.

Convention met at 7:30 p. m. Opened by song and prayer by Rev. T. H. Pritchard, D. D., of Wilmington. Rev. C. Durham introduced the preacher of the evening.

Services opened by singing "Nearer my God to Thee" Rev. Geo. B. Taylor, jr., after reading a part of the Scripture, lead in prayer.

The president read a telegram from the students at the Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky. Elder G. B. Bosticks was requested to reply to the telegram in name of the convention.

INTERNAL EDUCATION.

J. C. Scarborough, G. B. Bostick, J. B. Brewer, F. P. Houghs, J. F. Spantown, L. R. Mills, L. G. Howell and J. N. Stallings, Rev. Dr. Bell, of Philadelphia, Rev. Dr. J. P. Boyce, Chairman of the Faculty of the Southern Baptist Seminary at Louisville this morning.

On motion of Dr. J. D. Hoffman, the following names were added to the committee on periodicals: J. C. Scarborough, W. E. Gowenly and W. H. Handover.

An invitation was read from the Grand Lodge of Masons inviting the Association to participate in the ceremonies of laying the corner stone of the court house.

The Secretary then read the committee's report on Sunday schools. Remarks of this report were made by Mr. N. B. Broughton.

On motion of Rev. J. W. McManaway that a committee be appointed to consider the subject of colportage and carried.

A telegram was then read from Mr. John E. Ray, Dr. Mitchell was appointed to reply to the telegram as follows: "Colossians send five to seven, Philippians first, two to eleven."

Rev. Dr. B. Griffith, of Philadelphia, then addressed the convention on the Sunday school question.

The report on Sunday schools was adopted. Rev. Pattello, of Oxford, was heard on the colored Orphanage.

The committee on Colportage made their report which was set for a special order at 2 o'clock p. m.

Rev. Mr. Talsom lead in prayer. On motion of Dr. Pritchard, Dr. J. B. Boyce, of Louisville, Ky., the committee on colportage made the following report: "Your committee on colportage make the following recommendations."

1. That a system of colportage be inaugurated. 2. That the Board of Missions and the Sunday School Board be consolidated and that this work be committed to the consolidation.
