### Off for the State Grange.

Mr. J. T. Eaton, State Deputy of Patrons of Husbandry, was in the city yesterday on his way to the meeting of the State Grange, which convenes in Tarboro next Tuesday. He has revived and organized many Granges in this section during the past year, and will doubtless carry a good report to his brethren from other sections.

### Christ in the Camp.

Mr. A. M. Caffee is in the city canvassing for "Christ in the Camp," or "Religion in Lee's Army," by Rev. J. W. Jones, D. D. It is a religious history of the Army of Northern Virginia, giving the details of many interesting revivals, with illustrations. From a cursory examination of its pages we find it to be a very readable book. Anything connected with the history of that noble army is bound to prove more or less interesting. This book treats of a subject different in its scope and design from the many other books and papers that have been written; it takes up a phase of camp life that has generally been overlooked by most writers, but it is none the less interesting.

### Help a Good Thing.

The committee appointed by the Craven County Gun Club to solicit donations for the Game, Fish and Oyster Fair are now making a canvass of the city for contributions to that purpose. Three hundred dollars from the citizens of New Berne is all that is necessary to insure the Fair and make it a grand success.

If the committee succeed in raising this amount, and thus make it a certainty we expect to issue a ten thousand edition of the JOURNAL, thoroughly advertising the Fair and New Berne and her industries. We promise to bring a crowd here that will leave five dollars for every one invested in the Fair. But it is not so much the dollar that is to be left (we merely mention this to show that it will pay financially) as the good that will follow a visit of many strangers that we are after. The efforts of Commissioner Patrick in securing low rates of travel and in thoroughly advertising the enterprise will insure a large number of sportsmen and other visitors who have never been to New Berne. It will be the best advertisement that can be given of our city as a winter resort and will be sure to tell in the future.

### Conference Proceedings.

Our columns have been so crowded with other matters recently that we have been unable to give the proceedings of the M. E. Conference at Fayetteville. We give the following statistics which will show what the Methodists in North Carolina have done during the past year:

Members 56,262, gain 8,859; adults baptized 8,530; infants 3,697; churches 565, gain 18; value of churches \$217,448, gain in value \$63,194; parsonages 108, gain 4; value of parsonages \$186,828, gain in value \$3,060; money expended for churches and parsonages \$67,539; foreign missions \$11,228.22; domestic missions \$5,240.85; mission money from Sunday Schools \$2,106.96; conference anniversary \$241.77; self-denial collection, \$773.97; Woman's Missionary Society \$3,373; total amount raised for missions \$23,695.16; church extension \$3,295.27; education (independent of endowment, \$3,572.77; Sunday Schools \$69, gain 68; officers and teachers 6,430, gain 846; Sunday School scholars 55,077, gain 4,087; money spent for Sunday School literature, \$8,326.61; money raised on children's day, \$223.10; money raised on other objects, \$1,206.45; money paid presiding elders \$14,789.97, gain \$198.97; money paid preachers \$108,447.35, gain \$5,157.26; Bishop \$1,849.63; conference claimants, \$3,311.22; other objects, \$10,492.90; junior preachers, \$1,304.42; Bible cause, \$445.31; total amount of money raised for all purposes, \$245,974.26.

### Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners of Craven County, held at Court House on First Monday in December.

#### WEDNESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The board convened at 10 p. m., pursuant to adjournment. All present. Hon. O. C. Clark, attorney for D. Stinson, Isaac Patterson and H. G. Bates, appeared before the board and gave notice that in consequence of a judgment in the quo warranto proceedings just rendered against them at present fall term of Superior Court, Messrs. Stinson and Patterson will not renew their official bonds as sheriff and treasurer of Craven county. On motion of Commissioner Brinson, the following was adopted: Having been informed by Messrs. D. Stinson and Isaac Patterson, respectively acting sheriff and treasurer of Craven county, that the cases tried in the Superior Court at this term have decided the question that they are not in law entitled to these offices and that Messrs. Meyer Hahn and D. N. Kilburn are, and that they will not renew their bonds, it is ordered that notice issue to Meyer Hahn and D. N. Kilburn that the board will be in session on Saturday the 10th day of December, 1887, at 10 o'clock, to give them opportunity to be inducted into office, after complying with the requirements of the law. It is further ordered that like notice be issued to A. G. Oden in respect to the office of coroner, as the court has also decided that he is entitled thereto instead of H. G. Bates, who has been acting coroner.

Board adjourned to Thursday 11 o'clock.

#### THURSDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The board convened at 11 a. m. All present. D. Stinson returned notices to M. Hahn, D. N. Kilburn and A. G. Oden as having been served. Ordered that the chairman of the board inform His Excellency Governor Seales that owing to certain complications which may cause a vacancy in the office of Sheriff and Coroner of Craven county at the time set for the execution of Chas. F. Jones, December 16th, 1887, now confined in Craven county jail he is requested to respice the said Chas. F. Jones for thirty days. Ordered that Messrs M. Hahn, D. N. Kilburn and A. G. Oden be allowed until Monday, December 19th, 1887, to give their official bonds as sheriff, county treasurer and coroner of Craven county respectively. Board adjourned to Friday at 10 o'clock.

#### FRIDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Board convened at 10 o'clock. All present. The valuation of lot listed by Wm. Colligan on corner of Hancock and Queen streets, No. 8 township, is reduced from \$1,750 to \$1,500. The balance of the day was consumed in settling the accounts of Sheriff Stinson and M. Hahn. Board adjourned to 10 o'clock today.

### Underground Railway for New York.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—New York is to have an underground railroad. The plans have been perfected, the route determined, the consent of proper owners in ample sufficiency obtained, and the necessary capital subscribed for the building of an underground railroad, by which one may travel from the City Hall to the Grand Central Station in seven minutes. A four-track railroad, running express trains on the middle tracks and local trains on the outside tracks, is to be built from the postoffice, through Elm street and Fourth Avenue, to Forty-second street. Embarked in the enterprise are W. K. Vanderbilt, Cornelius Vanderbilt, Chauncey M. Depew, Orlando P. Patton, John Jacob Astor, Wm. W. Astor, Ehrlands, the Lorillard, and many representative people. The enterprise depends now solely on the adoption by the Common Council of the plans of the streets opening. The plans have been agreed upon by all the members save Mayor Hewitt, and he is said to be in favor of the scheme.

### Threatened Riot in Ohio.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, December 7.—Gov. Foraker this morning received a telegram from John Austin, sheriff of Lake county, saying that about one hundred ore handlers at Fairport had organized a strike, and by violence and threats preventing others from working, and that he was unable with any force he could command to make arrests. The Governor immediately telegraphed the sheriff that he had ordered Col. Fleak, commanding the Fifth Regiment, to assemble one hundred men, and hold them in readiness for further orders. —To discover a truth, and to separate it from a falsehood, is surely an occupation worthy of the best intellect, and not at all unworthy of the best heart.

## FOREIGN NEWS.

MOSCOW, Dec. 7.—The Gazette says the future policy of France will decide whether Germany will be compelled to watch one or both of her frontiers. The paper declares that Russia must always have a strong fleet in the Pacific ocean.

DUBLIN, Dec. 7.—The jury brought in a verdict of acquittal in the case of O'Leary one of the men charged with complicity in the murder of constable Wheelhap, at Lisdoonvarna, county Clare.

PARIS, Dec. 7.—President Carnot has summoned Goblet and requested him to form a new ministry.

BERLIN, Dec. 7.—The National Gazette, discussing the Vienna Fremblatt article relative to the massing of troops on the Russian frontier, says it is evident that the force of Russian troops now in Poland is not sufficient to attack two formidable military powers. The present massing of troops is too small for war and too large for peace. We must wait and see how Russia will reconcile the massing with the pacific assurance of the Journal de St. Petersburg.

### Departed This Life.

On 5th December, 1887, James W. Cox, in the 73d year of his age. A peaceable, quiet and inoffensive citizen, he honorably discharged the high duties of life and merited the unqualified approbation and esteem of friends and acquaintances. A true man to his race and the requirements of manhood, he was also true to his maker and the holy duties of Christian obligation amid afflictions, affliction and trials for years, he filled his usual seat in the church, true to his duty, when possible, as the needle to the pole.
