Kilburn, ex-treasurer, received and disbursed since the 1st of December. 1886, four thousand dollars of the inter est fund, save a balance of \$42.29, and Isaac Patterson, treasurer, has received and disbursed within the same period, \$5 \$88 03, save a balance on hand of \$527.58. Agricultural Interests. RECOMMENDATION OF COMMIS

SIONER COLEMAN IN HIS ANNUAL REPORT.

The annual report of Commissioner Colman, of the Agricultural Department, has been laid before the President. It recommends the abolition of the seed department and the transfer of its duties to the State and Territorial experiment stations, on the ground that the 185 bales at 9 to 9 90. directors of these institutes know better the wants of their respetive localities than the Department here.

In regard to the elevation of the Agricultural Department to an exe cutive department, Commissioner Colman discusses it in a manuer to show that he does not regard the change as expedient.

While the development of beet sugar is still in the experiment stage the commissioner thinks free. enough is known to enable the country to anticipate at an early day the production of sugar from a plant as easy of cultivation as corn, but little circumscribed by climatic influence, and one whose by products have a value equal to he cost of raising.

The large wheat product of this country and its importance are spoken of, and the commissioner states that the work of the bureau of animal industry has been greally governors of thirty one States and Territories have accepted the rules and regulations of the burean, and

promised the assistance of local police officers to secure their enforcement. The regions infected with cattle disease have been placed under rigid quarantine and up cattle allowed to leave them without careful examination and special permit. 
