The announcement yesterday morning that the holding of a Game, Fish and Oyster Fair in this city sometime during the winter or early spring had been abandoned for lack of funds to pay the incidental expenses was quite a surprise to many of our citizens and we are glad to be able to announce that the prospects are that it will be held. We hope to be able to announce tomorrow that a sufficient amount has been pledged to insure the success of the Fair.

The English Opera Company.
In reference to the English Opera Company that performs here next Friday night, the Springfield, Ohio Gazette says:

Why it was Abandoned.

Correction.
We are in receipt of two letters from Dover with information that the JOURNAL had done Frank Dawson, a very worthy colored man in that section, a great injustice in reporting the shooting affair between him and Henry Rouse. Our information was from a gentleman who came down on the train with Rouse who told him about it and stated that Dawson fired the first shot.

Our correspondents are both reliable gentlemen and they write us that Rouse fired on Dawson twice before the latter returned the fire, and that upon a trial before a justice for the affray Dawson was discharged and Rouse bound over to the next term of the Superior Court. They also state that Dawson is a very quiet, peaceable colored man and only fired on Rouse in self defence. We cheerfully make the correction.

Christmas Excursion Rates.
On the 23d, 24th and 25th instants the Atlantic Coast Line Railroads will have on sale at all of their stations what are called "Holiday Excursion" tickets. These tickets will be sold from any station of the line to any other, as may be desired, for one first class fare, and will be good for the return trip between such stations at any time until the 2d of January inclusive. In other words the ticket will be sold at half price for the round trip. Tickets with the same privileges will also be sold on December 29th, 30th and 31st, but the tickets sold on these dates will be available for the return trip until January 5th, inclusive.

The low rates offered will no doubt cause the interchange of many agreeable visits among our neighbors on the routes of the Atlantic Coast Line during the holidays, and will be at once an accommodation to the public and a source of revenue to the railroad companies.

The Condition of Ireland.
LONDON, Dec 14—Mr. Balfour, Chief Secretary for Ireland, addressed an immense assemblage in the Free Trade Hall, at Manchester tonight. In consequence of the warning that a plot had been formed to assassinate Mr. Balfour, the police guarded the approaches to the platform, and were stationed at various points in the interior of the hall. The barricades around the Free Trade Hall were extended to the Town Hall where Mr. Balfour sleeps under guard. As Mr. Balfour appeared upon the platform cheering by a portion of the audience failed to drown the noise of another portion. The preliminary speaking was amid great disorder. A number of lights took place and many persons were ejected from the hall. The malcontent element was finally subdued. Mr. Balfour in an elaborate criticism on the most recent speeches in favor of Home Rule compared Sir George Trevelyan to Bunyan's "Pilgrim," who started with a Christian on the right road, remained a short time, but falling into the slough of despond, promptly used violent language toward his former companions and finally returned to the city of destruction. The Radical party, in January 1886, thought that everything was right, which they had thought wrong in December 1885. Wheeling about at Gladstone's word of command, with the regularity of soldiers on a parade, they had gone now into the ranks of the Parallels, changing not only their old policy, but their old morality (cheers). They had sullied the character of their party forever. With a deterioration of their moral fibre the Radicals had adopted the methods of their Irish allies. These had long been accustomed to copious streams of violent rhetoric which made them incapable of that sobriety of statement which the country expected from practical statesmen. The utterances even of the foremost Separatist leaders showed an increase want of moral perception. Mr. Gladstone had been forced to retract some of the assertions made by him in his intemperate speech at Nottingham, but only under threat of a lawyer's letter. Mr. Trevelyan had said that the farmers in Ireland were being evicted by wholesale. The fact was that during the first three months of Mr. Trevelyan's administration as Chief Secretary for Ireland there were 858 evictions, while for the same period of the speaker's tenure of office the evictions numbered only 132. After rebutting the statements of Mr. Dillon and others on the condition of Ireland, he concluded by predicting a triumph of order under the policy of the government.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., December 14.—The commissioners of inquiry appointed by the Northern and Southern Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church, will begin their work of looking into the question of organic union of the two bodies today. It is likely that the conf. rence will last two or three days. The sessions will be strictly private.

The Immigration Bill.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 14.—The bill to regulate immigration introduced in the Senate today by Mr. Reagan, authorizes the Secretary of the Treasury to appoint inspectors of immigration, who shall have the power to board vessels and remove immigrants therefrom, in order to ascertain whether they are prohibited from landing under this act. The master of the vessel must procure a certificate from each immigrant, showing that such immigrant is neither a criminal, a pauper, nor an idiot, and is not an assisted immigrant, nor under contract to labor in the United States. It is made lawful for any body intercepted by this act to enter the country. All such unfortunates shall be returned at the expense of the owners of immigrant vessels.

The Woolfolk Trial.
MAON, Ga., Dec. 14.—This was the ninth day of the trial of Woolfolk, for murder. Mr. Rutherford, for the defense, concluded his two hours' speech at one o'clock, and at three o'clock Mr. Hardeman began his argument for the State. The court took a recess at five o'clock until nine tomorrow. During Mr. Hardeman's speech he was interrupted by cries of "hang him" from two or three men who were promptly put out. This created some excitement in the great crowd but order was promptly restored.

Looks well Applies for a Pension.
ATLANTA, Ga., December 14.—General Longstreet has applied for a State pension under the law passed by the last Legislature providing pensions to wounded Confederate soldiers. General Longstreet was wounded in the Second Day of the Wilderness. He is seventy years old and poor. The number of applications under the law is very large.
