The National Bank of New Berne has declared a semi-annual dividend of five per cent from the earnings of the past six months. This is healthy showing for this institution and tells the story of good management on the part of its officers, who are polite and accommodating as well as business-like.

Efforts are still being made to have the sentence of Ohas. F. Jones, the wife murderer, commuted to imprisonment for life. The county commissioners have been requested to forward a letter to the Governor for that purpose. It seems to be a hard matter to satisfy the public. There is a clamor against courts, juries and lawyers for allowing criminals to escape under the plea of insanity, and there is a clamor for clemency if the criminal convicted is not as bright as he ought to be.

Baltimore Trips Resumed.

The Clyde line of steamers has resumed the direct trips between Baltimore and New Berne. The Experiment is again on the line and the Stout, which was burned here last fall, has been rebuilt and will be on the line again in about three weeks.

Baptist Church.

Rev. Henry W. Battle of Wadesboro, N. C., will preach in the Middle Street Baptist church tonight and tomorrow night at half past seven o'clock, to which the public are cordially invited to attend. This gifted and eloquent young pastor belongs to a distinguished family in the South, being a son of Maj. Gen. Cullen A. Battle, and a nephew of A. J. Battle, D.D., President of Mercer University. He was born in Tuskegee, Ala., in 1855, and admitted to the practice of law at the age of nineteen, but abandoning the most flattering worldly prospects, he entered the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., where he remained sometime and then accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist Church at Columbus, Miss., but after several years, on account of his health, removed to Wadesboro, N. C., having been called to the pastorate of this church where he now resides.

Commissioners' Proceedings.

Board met at 9 a. m. All present. Wm. Colligan, J. F. Taylor, Harrell & Cooper, R. G. Clave, C. Erdman, Pool & Hines, J. W. & J. R. Moody, N. H. Shyron, were granted license to retail liquors for six months at their respective places of business upon payment of tax required by law.

The valuation of lot listed by A. A. Bryan in township No. 8 for 1887 was reduced from \$600 to \$500.

The valuation of lot listed by S. W. Smallwood for 1887 was reduced from \$1,500 to \$750, and the lot listed for \$500 was stricken from the list.

The poll tax charged to Edward Bidde, col., No. 8 township, was remitted, he being over the taxable age.

The poll tax charged to W. H. Moore, No. 8 township, was remitted, he being over age.

Tax charged to W. R. Moore of No. 8 township on \$285 of property was remitted on account of error.

Application of E. C. Roberts for reduction of valuation of property for 1887 was referred to commissioner Brinson and the assessors of No. 8 township.

The double tax charged to Rachael Bryan of No. 8 township for 1887 was remitted upon payment of single tax.

Application of John Dunn for reduction of taxes was referred to commissioner Brinson and S. R. Street with power to act.

The clerk was ordered to issue to John Dunn, guardian, a voucher for \$112 50 being interest on note held by him.

Mr. J. Isaac Patterson tendered his bonds as treasurer of the county which after due consideration were deemed good and sufficient and ordered registered. Mr. Patterson was then qualified according to law as treasurer.

The clerk was ordered to furnish the treasurer, Isaac Patterson, a certified statement of the moneys due Craven county by ex-treasurer D. N. Kilburn, together with a copy of the order, and treasurer Patterson was instructed to make a demand forthwith upon said ex-treasurer Kilburn for said moneys and all other property, books, etc., in his hands belonging to the county.

The committee on court bill reported that they had examined the bill for fall term 1887 and found the amount to be \$384 80 as made up by the clerk, but the county is legally bound for only \$388 51 of said bill. The report was adopted.

A voucher was ordered issued to S. F. Teiser for \$3 70 in settlement of claims.

Daniel Stinson, Sheriff elect, was allowed until Saturday, January 7th to complete his bonds.

The proposition of J. J. Tolson, agent, to furnish rations to the county poor at fourteen cents per head was accepted.

A voucher for \$41 50 was ordered issued to Wm. Foy in place of former vouchers.

The sheriff was ordered to convey Lucy Howard and her six children to her home in Georgia at the expense of the county provided said expense does not exceed \$80 00.

Adjourned to Wednesday.

QUEENSTOWN, Dec. 31.—The steamer Lord Gough from Philadelphia, Dec. 15, for Liverpool arrived here at 4 p. m. today. She experienced terrible weather on the passage. For eight days the passengers were not allowed on the upper deck, hatches were battered down, but despite their precaution a quantity of water penetrated below the stowage from the seas shipped by the steamer.
