A Paying Enterprise.

The question of erecting cotton factories is being agitated by several towns in North Carolina. Charlotte has already raised a large amount of money for a factory and another is being talked of. Raleigh is also being aroused on the subject and is likely to embark in the enterprise very soon.

At the meeting held in Raleigh to consider the establishment of a factory, many good talks were made and preliminary steps taken to raise the amount of capital necessary. B. H. Hann Esq. President of the Rocky Mount Cotton Mills was present and being called upon made a talk.

In the course of his remarks he spoke of the year 1885 in which there was an over production of goods and at which time some factories suffered. He also stated that in the first six months of the year he had not started in the market with any other enterprise that could possibly be inaugurated in the year.

Nothing But a Show. As the special train that took a number of our citizens to Goldsboro on Saturday night was spinning its way back, it being a bright moonlight night, the engineer suddenly pulled up and when the conductor learned the cause the train moved slowly and solemnly back some distance.

Railroad Building in Western North Carolina. If no untoward event happens, not apprehended, we believe the construction of new railroads through different sections of Western Carolina in this year, 1888, will be surprising.

Col. Tate's road from Shelby via Morganton to Cranberry is under construction and will be rapidly pushed. The Three C's road Col. Frank Cox's President, will be pushed from Rutherford via Marion to Cranberry during this year.

Many believe the Carolina Central Road will be extended from Rutherford to Asheville this year. The road from Aiken via Edgefield and Pickens S. C. to Asheville is now under construction, and it is believed will be completed to this city next year.

In another year it is earnestly hoped the W. N. C. Road from Asheville to Murphy, N. C. will be quite if not entirely completed to the latter point.

I understand the government is ready to make a sufficient appropriation for the same on the bill presented by our worthy member of Congress, Hon. F. M. Simmons. Who has the petition? Don't let the same sleep for want of a circulation. We are entitled to this road which will afford a magnificent drive up the river shore. If a thing is not worth asking for it is not worth having. Who will move in this matter? I will pay my part to some good citizen who will circulate this petition. Let it first be amended by striking out one unnecessary provision to the measure on the part of the government. What a grand avenue of a fast drive it will afford! Not only our ladies, but all lovers of the horse are interested in this beautiful road, which will not cost to build fifteen thousand dollars. Let us have it and let us move at once in the matter. It will more than double the price of land fronting on such a beautiful road. Our member of Congress has introduced the bill and is now waiting for us to send him the petition. Let it go at once! Also let us move at once in obtaining a government building here. This is a part of duty and the residence of the U. S. Judge of this district where the government courts are held. We can have this building if we will move in the matter. Let our Board of Trade meet, whether here or out of town, and let us have the whole of our city and county organized in this movement. We now have a member of congress who can secure this building for us if we will only send him the petition. Let our Board of Trade set forth the many reasons why such a building is required here among which may be included the amount of revenue paid to North Carolina since the war and the many reasons why we will have a member of congress who can do it for us. What our present state and popular member can now accomplish for us if we will only support him as we should in this important matter. Let the different bodies of standing and influence be united together at once, and let them best in representing the important matter of a public building in the best possible light, an enterprise is sure.

THE LATEST NEWS.

Condensed from our Exchanges. The small pox epidemic is raging in San Francisco. The Concord, N. C. Times says two negroes froze to death in Cabarrus county last week. Speaker Carlisle's health has so far improved as to enable him to take a trip from Washington to Fortress Monroe.

In St. Paul last Friday a railroad accident occurred in which fourteen persons were injured, some of them fatally. A colored woman living in New York was married when eleven years old. She is now a grandmother at the age of twenty-five.

From what the State papers say the public roads of North Carolina are in worse condition than they have been for a long time. The earnings of the Norfolk & Western Railroad Company for the past year were nearly half million dollars in excess of the previous year.

Two Germans in an old-fashioned hotel in New York City were arrested for their cases two days after the murder. The Governor's committee of the House will make a report recommending that the Reading strike inquiry be referred to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The location of the new city hall, which will be built on the site of the old one, is now determined upon. It will be situated on the Middleton property and will be a half block and a half from the Washington street. The Senate has passed a bill giving Gen. John A. Logan a widow a pension of \$2,000 a year. The New York World says it would be observed that the Confederates in the body stand to the Union soldiers widow.

We learn from the Wilmington Star that the Board of Aldermen of that city have ordered an election on the question of subscription to the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley and the Wilmington, Oculow & East Carolina Railroad. The entry list for the six day regatta you please race in Madison Square Garden, New York, which takes place February 5 to 12, closed with a satisfactory result. This is a greater number than ever participated in a like event, and it is said the quality of the participants is above the standard.

The great snow storm which has been prevailing in New England, is the most severe ever known. In some places drifts were forty feet deep. Miles of railroad cars were snowed in and in some instances passengers suffered greatly from the cold. In consequence of the blockade on the railroad a milk famine is threatened in New York.

The contractors have begun work on the framing of the assembly building for the North Carolina Teachers' Association at Morehead City. The corner stone will be laid on the 23rd of April next with appropriate ceremonies. It is said the building will be one of the handsomest and most complete structures belonging to an educational organization that is to be found in the country.
