Largest Cotton Mill in the World. [1] If a recent consular report is to be accepted as true, then Russia has one oot ton mill by the side of which the largest

mill in America must look small. New Orleans Cotton World, speaking of it. says:

We learn from a foreign consular re port recently published that the largest cotton mill in the world is that of Krahnholm, in Russia. This colossal establishment contains 340,000 spindles and 2,200 looms, disposes of a force of 6,300 horse-power, and gives employment to 7,000 hands. The motive power is obtained from a fall on the river Marows, which actuates eight turbines. which were manufactured in Augsburg. Four of these turbines produce a force of 4.000 horse-power each, and discharge 18,000 litres of water per second, one having been mounted in 1867, since which time it has worked THIS ADVERTISEMENT, night and day without any repairs.
