An Important Decision,

From the News & Observer we get We have another communication from the following digest of the Supreme Court decisions:

There was assessed against some lots owned by the plaintiff in Halifax county taxes to the amount of \$23.40, which the sheriff was proceeding to collect, when the plaintiff asked for an injunc tion on the ground that the lots were exempt from taxation under the charter of the company, as held by the Supreme Court of the United States in 1 lace, p. 264.

He'd, That the act of Assembly, sec. 84, chap, 187, acts of 1887, forbidding any court to issue an injunction to re strain the collection of a tax except where the same is levied for an illegal or unauthorized purpose, and requiring the payment of the tax with liberty to sue for the same, is constitutional, and such injunctions can no longer be

This is the act under which the commissioners of Carteret county resisted an injunction against the collection of taxes in excess of the constitutional limit; claiming that such levy was for a legal and authorized purpose. The case was ably argued by Hon. C. R. Thomas for the tax payers and Clement Manly, Esq., for the commissioners before Judge Phillips at Kinston last fall. This decision does away with the injunctive remedy against excessive taxation, and we might say virtually abolishes all restraint to such excess unless levied for an unauthorized on an illegal purpose. It the tax exceeds the con: stitutional limit the taxpayer is bound to pay it and then sue the county for its recovery. It will be apparent at once that the remedy though adequate is utterly impracticable.
