## HURRAH FOR THE FAIR!

An Attractive Exhibit.

Grand Preparations.

Governor Scoles and the Davis Cadets—A Large Crowd Expected.

The work of preparing for the Fair was pushed with vigor yesterday and continued until 12 o'clock last night. It will be resumed early Monday morning and everything will be ready for the formal opening of the Fair by Governor Scoles at 12 o'clock Tuesday.

It is now certain that we will have one of the most attractive exhibits ever seen in North Carolina, and that a large crowd will be in attendance. Governor Scoles will be escorted from Goldsboro by the Davis Cadets on Monday evening. Full program will be announced Tuesday morning.

**Bureau of Information.**

The Superintendent will be at his office, corner of Broad and Middle streets, on Monday from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m., and would be glad to see as many persons as possible in reference to entertaining the crowd during the Fair.

It is proposed that guests sent out shall pay in advance at the Bureau and be furnished with tickets which will be taken up by those who entertain and cashed by the Superintendent on presentation.

The public can be fully informed by applying at the Bureau.

**Big Sales.**

Capt. Enloe has sold in this city this winter eighty-three horses and mules for cash aggregating \$9,895.00. When this is put to the immense sales made by Stewart for cash and on time, and the sales made by other dealers some idea can be given of the amount of money spent in this section each year for stock. This is a drain upon our farmers that ought to be stopped. Horses and mules can be raised as easy and as profitably in Eastern North Carolina as anywhere, but it seems that our farmers don't get at it.

But does not Capt. Enloe's sales show that there is more money among our farmers than had been supposed? Who would have thought last fall, with the general complaint of short crops, that even eighty horses and mules (there must have been at least two hundred) could have been sold to farmers for cash? Yet it has been done and we think it a favorable sign that they are improving financially.

A police force will be engaged to guard them during the night and they will be in position ready for the opening of the Fair on Tuesday morning. Let us hope they may be yet some misunderstanding about charges for exhibits we repeat that no charge is made for space to exhibit home manufactured goods, farm products, woods, marls, taxidermy, fancy work, in fact for anything except merchants who wish to display their goods as a means of advertising.

We ask all who desire to aid in making the Fair a success, and we are sure every good citizen of New Berne wants to do this, to bring out something for exhibit. A large crowd will be here and we want to show them what we can do.

## THE LATEST NEWS

Condensed from our Exchanges.

The situation of the Burlington strike is reported unchanged.

A man had the top of his head cut off on a Georgia railroad Thursday.

Cherp rates for Southern immigrants have been secured over most of the railroad.

Gen. D. H. Strother, "Porte Crayon," died at Charleston, West Virginia, Thursday.

The Crown Prince of Germany continues to improve. He sleeps soundly and he has a good appetite.

A gang of Italian counterfeiters were arrested in Norfolk the other day. They had flooded the city with counterfeit silver dollars.

A petition, said to have over 102,000 signatures, was presented in the Senate Thursday against the admittance of Utah as a State while under the control of the Mormon priesthood.

A bogus circular addressed to Southern postmasters, has been sent out from Washington, purporting to emanate from the Congressional Democratic Campaign Committee.

The bridge over the Pee Dee river on the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta railroad has been rebuilt and the trains via Atlantic Coast Line have resumed regular travel on that road.

Raleigh Visitor says Eugene G. Harrell, Esq., one of our most prominent and popular business men, was last night unanimously elected Captain of the Governor's Guard and has accepted the position.

The Secretary of the Treasury now estimates that the surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30th, will reach \$155,000,000, an excess of fifteen millions over his estimate submitted to Congress in December last.

A special to the News & Observer from Edenton, N. C., says Roper's saw and planing mill, on the Norfolk & Southern Railroad, in Chowan county, was destroyed by fire last Wednesday night. The loss was heavy. No insurance.

The pension bill was again considered in the State Thursday and several speeches delivered, when a vote was taken on the proposed amendment, adding the words, "the infirmities of age," and which was rejected, yeas 13, nays 43. Other amendments were also rejected, and the bill was finally passed by a vote of 44 to 16. In the House a bill was passed, after much discussion, appropriating \$10,000 for the purchase of certain awards belonging to the widow of Gen. Shields, and a bill was reported for the establishment of a postal telegraph.
