The pension bill was again considered in the State Thursday and several speeches delivered, when a vote was taken on the proposed amendment, adding the words, "the infirmities of age," and which was rejected, yeas 13, nays 43. Other amendments were also rejected, and the bill was finally passed by a vote of 44 to 16. In the House a bill was passed, after much discussion, appropriating \$10,000 for the purchase of certain swords belonging to the widow of Gen. Shields, and a bill was reported for the establishment of a postal telegraph.
