Governor Soles yesterday ordered a special term of Harnet Superior Court for the trial of civil causes only, to begin May 4th and to continue one week, Judge Shipp to preside.

Mrs. J. A. Meadows, secretary of the Ladies' Auxiliary Society to the Y. M. C. A., requests us to announce that there will be no meeting of the society today, and that she will give notice of the next meeting.

Governor Soles and Treasurer Bain will, in company with President Bryan, go to Morehead City tomorrow on special train and will observe the improvements there and also the improvements of the road. They expect to return to Raleigh tomorrow evening.

At 6 o'clock yesterday morning an accidental fire entirely destroyed the residence of J. O. L. Harris, Esq., near Raleigh. Loss about \$1,500. No insurance. The family were turned out doors on an icy cold morning. The fire originated in the kitchen. Some of the furniture was saved.

THE GAME, FISH AND OYSTER FAIR.

GRAND OPENING TODAY.

PROGRAM OF EXERCISES.

The first annual Fair of the Eastern Carolina Game, Fish, Oyster and Industrial Association will be opened today at 12 o'clock by Governor A. M. Soles. At 11 o'clock the Davis Cadets and the Governor's Guard will assemble at the corner of Broad and Middle streets and carriages with Mayor of the city, officers of the Fair, distinguished visitors and citizens will follow them under direction of the Chief Marshal, Capt. Matt Manly, down Broad street to Craven up Craven to Neuse, down Neuse to East Front to H. R. Bryan's residence where the Governor will be received. The procession will then move down East Front to Broad, up Broad to Craven, down Craven to South Front, up South Front to Middle, up Middle to Pollock, up Pollock to Metcalf, up Metcalf to Neuse, down Neuse to South gate of the Academy Green, where the Governor will, after introduction by John S. Long, Esq., formally open the Fair.

The Way to Visit the Fair.

In the first place procure a ticket, which can be had at the front gate of the Academy Green for a single quarter, fifteen cents for children. Go in at the front door, turn to the right into the first room and behold the products of the water, and the tackle with which they are taken out. Go on to the next room and behold the fowls of the air and birds of the forest; from here cross the hall to the southwest room and drink in the exhibits by Redmond, John Dunn and others; thence to the east-room and you are in the marl pit, rice mill, oil mill, wood pulp, blacksmith work, etc.; when you go out of this room you find yourself at the foot of the stairway; ascend and go through each room as below. Time and space will not permit us to tell what can be seen in these rooms; the ladies have charge here, and this is sufficient notice for all to go and see. When you have gone through the eight rooms go out the west door and see the exhibits on the grounds. By this time you will be hungry, go to the old Academy building, see floral exhibit and gratify the appetite by calling at the restaurant in the west room.

Arrival of the Governor and Other Distinguished Citizens.

The first section of the mail train arrived from Goldsboro 8:30 last night bringing the Governor and Mrs. Soles, Treasurer D. W. Bain, Auditor W. P. Roberts, Judge Avery, Harry Skinner, Esq., of Greenville, W. B. Reid, Mayor of La Grange A. T. Hill, Mayor of Kinston, N. J. Rouse, Esq., Messrs. J. W. Grainger, W. L. Kennedy, Dempsey Wood and Rev. J. H. Page of Kinston, Major B. S. Tacker and Col. F. A. Olds of Raleigh, Mr. D. S. Cowan of Wilmington, the Governor's Guard commanded by Capt. E. G. Harrell, about forty strong, and the Davis Cadets commanded by Col. A. C. Davis.

At Kinston a large crowd assembled at the train with the Level City Band and called for the Governor who responded in a neat little speech.

A large crowd assembled at the depot to welcome the Governor and his escorts. The Governor and Mrs. Soles were conducted to the residence of Henry R. Bryan, Esq., the procession following. The horses drawing the carriage with the Governor and Mrs. Soles became unruly and somewhat marred the occasion, but no accident happened.

The Davis Cadets about two hundred strong are quartered in Stanley Hall. The Governor's Guard took rooms at Hotel Albert and elsewhere where rooms could be obtained.

The steamer Kinston brought down a good crowd from up Neuse, and the prospects are that the Fair will open with a large crowd present.

One hundred of the Barnside veterans will arrive tonight.

The mail train arrived about 10:30, bringing a large crowd.
