The first annual Fair of the Eastern Carolina Game, Fish, Oyster and industrial Association will be opened today at 12 o'clock by Governor A. M. Scales. The procession will then move down East Front to Broad, up Broad to Craven, down Craven to South Front, up South Front to Middle. up Middle to Pollock, up Pollock to Metcalf, up Metcalf to Neuse, down Neuse to South gate of the Academy Green, where the Governor will, after introduction by John S. Long, Esq., formally open the Fair.
