Kinston was in the city yesterday to hear the case of U. S. vs. Jos. W. Watwith using the United States mails for fraudulent purposes.

Clement Manly, Eeq. and Hon, C. C. Clark appeared for the defendants, distriot attorney F. H. Busbee, Esq., for the government.

The government introduced the postmaster at New Berne, a postoffice inspector, the agent of the Southern Express Company, clerk of the Clyde line of steamers, the cashier of the National Bank and the collector of the same, and other business men of the city to show that the defendants had used the mails in the practice of a scheme and artifice to obtain goods fraudulently.

The defendants introduced no testimony but their counsel argued to the Commissioner the inefficiency of the tesasked that the defendants be discharged.

The district attorney in reply argued that enough evidence had been introduced to show, not only probable cause but a prima facie case, and asked that the defendants be bound over for their appearance at the next term of the distriot court. They were bound in the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars each for their appearance at the spring term of the district court.
