FARMERS' ORGANIZATIONS.

We publish in another column a call to the farmers of Craven and Pamlico counties from an organizer of the Farmer's Alliance.
 All our farmer readers must by this time thoroughly understand the position of the Farmer's Alliance on the question of farmer organizations. Having spent thirty-two years of our life on a farm we are able to know something of the difficulties and trials as well as the pleasures that attend this most laborable and useful of all callings.
 That the right kind of organization among farmers is rapidly becoming much good, no intelligent farmer will deny; but organization must not be relied upon as the panacea for all the evils and difficulties that lay in the path of agricultural life. Individual effort, thrift, industry, good judgment in draining, manuring, planting and cultivating, proper care of stock and farm implements, and a judicious diversification of crops, will go far towards making a farmer independent within himself. But no man liveth unto himself. The right kind of an organization will bring farmers together for consultation and interchange of views; for encouragement in experimental and intensive farming; for cooperation in neighborhood schools, and to consider the advantages of cooperation in buying and selling; for arbitrating and adjusting their differences without going to law; for the purpose of condemning the passage of laws detrimental to their interest, and for recommending and urging the passage of such laws as will promote agriculture and develop the resources of the country.
 But there is danger of too much organization. It takes money to keep one of any kind in working order, and too many of them will absorb the farmer's net earnings and he will soon come to the conclusion that it is all a farce and only a money making scheme on the part of some shrewd rascal.
 Again, it is unnecessary for a farmers' organization to usurp the work of the church. To relieve the sick, the afflicted and the distressed, is a duty incumbent upon all men, but more especially is it the work of the Church of Christ and societies formed for that purpose. No farmer can afford to neglect the duty he owes his church by trying to do its work in another organization.
 Our farmers ought to organize, but they must keep steadily in view the legitimate objects of their organization. If they attempt to array themselves against all other classes, they will fail. But if they will encourage individual effort, thrift and the use of good judgment they will succeed.
